

BANKRUPTCY SUIT THREATENS ZION

One of Dowie's Creditors Begins Proceedings in Big Legal Battle.

Chicago, April 26.—Involuntary bankruptcy proceedings were started late this afternoon against John Alexander Dowie, individually, before Judge K. M. Landis. Ransom F. Walker is one of

the Dowieites, whose Dowie is attacking the transfer in the courts and has sought an injunction restraining Voliva and Granger from interfering with him.

Before a receiver is appointed on the petition in bankruptcy, the United States court will endeavor to determine who has the proper title to the property.

A Three-Cornered Fight. The petition therefore presents a three-cornered fight which, from present indications, promises to be long drawn out.

The petition alleges that on March 3 Dowie transferred property valued at \$1,200 to Margaret H. Fielder, and that on Jan. 10 other property was trans-

ferred to James H. Hirsch, thus showing preference to those creditors over others, which is alleged to be a violation of the bankruptcy law.

The court set the hearing for next Monday morning.

Injunction Hearing. Rockford, Ill., April 25.—The Dowie injunction hearing, set for yesterday, was continued till May, when it will be heard by Judges Wright, Frost and Donnelly, en banc. The place of hearing has not been decided.

These transfers will be made to the mint, where the money will be available.

Plan for Payments. The form of procedure will be for the depositors to draw checks in the usual form. These will be endorsed by the cashier or other officer of the bank and the customers may have them cashed at the mint.

Superintendent of the Mint Leach has indicated his willingness to assist in carrying into effect this plan if furnished with a sufficient force of clerks. The bankers are waiting for the opening of their vaults so that they may reach their books and papers. Checks and blanks which are yet to be printed will form necessary parts of the machinery it is proposed to put into operation.

It may be three weeks before the banks make any of these preliminary payments.

CITY IS SHAKEN AGAIN

Another Earthquake Kills Woman and Sends Many Walls Down.

San Francisco, April 26.—An earthquake shock of a few seconds duration brought down a hundred tottering walls, resulted in one death and started panic anew in the camps, in the western addition and in Oakland, late yesterday afternoon.

Mrs. Annie Whitaker, aged 35, was at work in the kitchen of her home on Shotwell street, in the mission district, when the shock caused the chimney, which had been left in a tottering condition by the heavy quake last Wednesday, to crash through the roof upon her, fracturing her skull. Her body was taken to the morgue at Portsmouth square, and buried an hour later at Laurel hill cemetery.

Thousands Frightened. The movement was a vigorous one from southwest to northwest. Many thousands who had made up their minds to remain in the camps are preparing to cross the bay.

In Oakland the people ran out of their homes. In the hotels, women screamed and fled down stairways to the street. Apparent damage was done. Cornices and chimneys shattered a week ago, were again sent in motion and fell into the street. The absorption question is "When will the convulsions cease?"

Word comes from Lick Observatory that they will soon cease and that the end will be well. But this bulletin does not instill confidence, for the people put it down as a guess. Many of the men at work repairing buildings in Oakland quit work. There is scarcely a building that escaped damage from the shake-up last Wednesday.

DAMAGE NORTH OF FRISCO

Earthquake Caused Considerable Property Loss in Several Towns.

San Francisco, April 26.—News has just been received here of the damage done by the earthquake of April 18 in the northern counties of the state.

In Lakewood, Lake county, a severe shock at 6:40 a. m. did considerable damage. The two-story brick walls of Masonic hall in course of construction were reduced to ruins. Several other brick blocks were cracked, chimneys toppled over throughout the town and show windows of business houses the full length of Main street were shattered.

No one was injured. The loss to the Masonic hall is about \$4,000.

At Albion, Mendocino county, a heavy shock was felt at 5:25 a. m. of April 18. The Occidental hotel is wrecked. All the big sawmills in this region are badly damaged. They will have to shut down for some time. So far as can be learned there were no lives lost.

At Anderson, in Shasta county, the earthquake occurred at 5:30 a. m. Chimneys tumbled down and windows, dishes and furniture were demolished. There are many wide fissures in the earth.

The damage to the Southern Humboldt Lumber company's dam across Indian creek will run into the thousands.

CHINESE PRAY IN RUINS

Celestials Kneel in Ashes Before Charred Heathen God.

San Francisco, April 26.—With unwavering faith, twenty Chinese gathered in a desolate spot of the ruins of Chinatown yesterday and worshipped in full compliance with the rites of their religion.

Prostrate in the smoldering wreckage before them was the charred trunk of the image that once held the altar in the temple of Shat Tai. The fumes of fresh incense and sacred punk curled skyward from the remains obtainable under the circumstances were spread in propitiatory offering to the devil, that no offense to that personage might bring a recurrence of the disaster.

No detail was given by the faithful Chinese who pleaded for mercy in behalf of their 35,000 countrymen made homeless by the holocaust.



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
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the petitioning creditors. He is guardian of the estate of Ethel B. Foley, a minor, and conservator of William T. Foley. The claims involved amount to \$7,000.
