### MINERS ASK LESS IN NEW PROPOSALS

Mitchell Sends Two Propositions Affecting Earnings to Hard Coal Operators.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., April 27.—In connection with the decision of the anthracite miners to hold a convention at Scranton next Thursday to take action upon the reply of the operators, if any, to two propositions submitted to President Baer and his associates yesterday, President Mitchell has made public the two propositions, together with a request for another joint conference.

The first asks for an increase in wages ranging from 5 to 15 per cent. The second asks for an advance equal to 10 cents per ton upon the total production of coal, to be added to the wages of employees and apportioned in such percentage as may be agreed upon.

Commenting on the propositions, the miners' communication says: "We have eliminated every feature of our former proposals to which you have objected except that of wages, and in the matter of wages we have kept in mind your oft-repeated statement that to grant our original demands would result in advancing the cost to the consumer of domestic coal 10 per cent."

"While we have not been able, even by the most careful analysis, to ascertain by what process of reasoning you have reached your conclusions as to the alleged necessity of such an advance, we beg to assure you that we have no desire, neither would we consent, to become parties to any compact that would increase the cost of domestic fuel to such an extent."

## SALARIES TOO LOW, SAYS BONAPARTE

Secretary of Navy Tells Municipal League Why Good Men Shun Public Service.

Atlantic City, N. J., April 27.—Secretary of the Navy Charles J. Bonaparte, who is president of the National Municipal League, was the principal speaker last night at the annual convention of the league now being held here. He took for his subject, "Why We Have Unsatisfactory Public Servants and How We Can Get Good Ones."

He said in part: "For ten months I have been led by my surroundings to consider frequently why our best men so often shun public life, and especially public service, and the subject appears to me of such grave import that I venture to ask for it the mature consideration of the league."

"Why do really first-class men, as a rule, shun public employment in its higher grades? Because public offices of great responsibility are generally and grossly underpaid. A very little thought should serve to show that the trusts and the multi-millionaires get what they pay for and we get what we pay for like wise. The difference is that they are sufficiently sensible to know they must pay for what they want in order to get what they want, and we are sufficiently silly to think we can get what we want without paying a fair value."
