

SAVES WOMAN'S LIFE BY CUTTING HER THROAT

Journal Special Service. New York, April 27.—With her throat cut and breathing thru a tube, Miss Bertha Wolfar of First avenue, who tried to kill herself with acid Wednesday night, is in Bellevue hospital today, and the physicians say she will recover. Miss Wolfar, who is the mother of two children, swallowed lye, a stringent cleaning fluid, and when Dr. Hunter arrived she was carried to the ambulance and the driver was told to speed to Bellevue hospital. On the way the physician saw that the woman's throat was closing and that she was strangling. With a quick incision of his knife her throat was cut and the operation of tracheotomy was performed while the ambulance rattled over the cobblestones.

ARRESTS THREATENED TO COLLEGE GAMBLERS

Journal Special Service. New York, April 27.—Clarence D. Ashley, dean of the New York University law school, discovered some time ago that considerable mild gambling was going on among students. Playing craps and matching coins were prominent forms of gaming. In consequence of this discovery Dean Ashley had the following note read to the students: "It has come to my attention that gambling is going on in New York university law school. This must cease at once. Any student found gambling within the precincts of the university not only will be summarily dismissed, but also will be proceeded against criminally, under the penal code. His name also will be sent to the character committee of the bar examination board, so that he cannot thereafter be admitted to practice at the bar."

GANFIELD'S GAMBLING PALACE MAY BE OPENED

New York, April 27.—If present plans do not miscarry, Richard Ganfield's gilded palace of gambling, just back of Delmonico's, in Forty-fourth street, is to reopen, perhaps with much of its former splendor. The place has been closed since the spectacular raid made on it by District Attorney Jerome, about three years ago. In the well-informed circles of the Tenderloin it is said that David Bucklin, Ganfield's former manager, has been the only applicant for a deed to the "palace." At the headquarters of the bookmakers' organization it was freely said Bucklin had failed in his Cuban project and had returned here to open Ganfield's place.

PARROT'S WARNING SAVES MANY LIVES

New York, April 27.—Nestling among the shorthirts of Chinatown, in Bowers street, which is the crook of the elbow of that crookedest of streets, a double-decker tenement, six stories high, rears its rusty red mansard above the top of its fellows. There was a fire there yesterday. Away up at the top abides the caretaker, Mrs. Emerson, with her famous parrot, Green Sulphur, the national bird of Chinatown. It was Green Sulphur that gave the alarm. Her pleasant shop talk suddenly switched to alarmed shrieks of "Mama! Mama! Fire! Fire!" When the firemen came the whole building, from cellar to cornice, was smoking like a limekiln. But the hundred of more "Chinks" had sought safety barely in time because of Polly's warning cry.

DYNAMITE ON TRACK

Harrisburg, Pa., April 27.—J. F. Good, engineer, was killed and C. H. Le Four, fireman, and I. J. Wallower, brakeman, were fatally injured today by the explosion of an east-bound freight locomotive at Ducklow Tower, Steelton, on the Pennsylvania railroad. The cause of the explosion is not known, but the theory is advanced that the engine struck a stick of dynamite accidentally dropped along the tracks.
