

STRONG DEFENSE IN HERESY TRIAL

Counsel for Dr. Crapsey, on Trial at Batavia, N. Y., Finishes Arguments.

Batavia, N. Y., April 28.—The tide seemed to turn in favor of Algeon E. Crapsey, St. Andrew's Episcopal church, Rochester, in his trial on a charge of heresy, before the western New York ecclesiastical council yesterday.

The day was devoted to summing up of both sides. While vigorous demands were made by counsel for the prosecution for a conviction, Dr. Crapsey's counsel, in masterly and eloquent argument, created a profound impression, and the prospects of their client escaping the fate that has seemed to be in store for him appeared much brighter at the close of the session.

The summing up will be concluded today and the case will then be taken under advisement by the court. Then, after a careful review of the evidence, will be reported to Bishop Walker of this diocese and he will announce the verdict. If it is against Dr. Crapsey, an appeal will be taken.

Mrs. Crapsey in Court. Dr. Crapsey's wife was an interested listener throughout the day. It was her first attendance at the trial, although her daughter has been in the courtroom every day.

Mrs. Crapsey, who sat next to the counsel for the prosecution, exonerated her husband for his alleged heretic utterances, and Dr. Crapsey, turning to her, said softly and earnestly, "My dear, it will be all right."

There were many church women in the throng of spectators. The summing up was begun by Attorney F. E. Lock of Buffalo, counsel for the prosecution.

"This is no church for Dr. Crapsey," he declared. "Let him go to the Unitarians or the evangelists. I admit that his daily life is exemplary and his nature splendid, but they only magnify his offense. His belief is wrong."

Congressman Perkins, responding for the defense, laid particular stress upon a certain clause of the service for the ordination of priests wherein the bishop asks the applicant: "Are you determined to teach nothing as necessary to eternal salvation but that which you shall be persuaded may be concluded and proved by the Scriptures?"

Perkins makes strong plea. "A man is told," he continued, "to study the scriptures for himself and to interpret not according to what he is told by others, but according to what he is persuaded may be concluded and proved therefrom. These words are plain and clear; there is no mistaking them, but, according to the presentment of the prosecution, Dr. Crapsey must break this vow as above set forth."

Mr. Perkins paid his respects to Rev. Mr. Alexander, former rector of St. Andrew's church, who took notes of Dr. Crapsey's sermons, and it is alleged, tried to get his position.

"He held himself up to public scorn as the witness said," he said. "It will be a sad day for the church if a man of Dr. Crapsey's character is thrust out and a man of Dr. Alexander's stamp is allowed to stay in."

Mr. Perkins, analyzing Dr. Crapsey's statement, said: "The exact meaning of what Dr. Crapsey has said and the foundation for his position are found in the Scriptures. It is not Dr. Crapsey who is on trial, but his church. So far as his utterance regarding the birth of Christ is concerned, it isn't actually material whether Christ was born in one way or another, naturally or supernaturally. It is the miracle of the universe established by law that makes us feel the necessity of believing in an almighty ruler."

Rev. Dr. Edward Worcester, of Emanuel church, Boston, following Mr. Perkins for the defense, said that while he felt that some parts of Dr. Crapsey's book "Religion and Politics," were "extremely bad taste," he considered that they were "warranted in the heat and ardor of a man enthused over his work."

Says Accused Is Loyal. Dr. Samuel McComb, who is associated with Dr. Worcester at Emanuel church, Boston, and who recently left the Presbyterian faith, made an impassioned plea for the accused clergyman. He produced sermons Dr. Crapsey delivered in 1890, long before the alleged heretic promulgation and said that they contained the most perfect expression of the church creed he had ever read.

"Dr. Crapsey is loyal to the fundamental principle of the church creed," he said. "No more loyal church officer ever lived than he. It would be an outrage to the church to dismiss him."

Attorney Obrian and Justice Stines of Rhode Island for the prosecution, and Attorney Edward M. Shepard of New York for the defense, will sum up today.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP DEBATED AT NORTHFIELD.

College Men in Annual Contest Put Up a Close Contest—Decision for Carleton Was 2 to 1.

Special to The Journal. Northfield, Minn., April 28.—Teams from Carleton college and the University of North Dakota met here last night in a forensic contest, Carleton winning by a majority vote of the three judges.

The question debated was: "Resolved, That private ownership and operation of street railways is preferable to municipal ownership and operation in the cities of the United States; granted that the cities have the legal right to contract the debt."

Carleton supported the negative and presented as its speakers E. W. Cross, C. G. Krause and D. S. Brainerd. North Dakota was represented by Fred E. McCurdy, Daniel V. Brennan and William Hutchinson. This was the annual debate between the two institutions.

The judges were Rev. L. A. Crandall and Judge A. C. Hickman of Minneapolis and Professor William P. Ten Broeck of Earlham. The debate was heard by a large audience of college men and women and was well contested on both sides.

DEALS BLOW TO M. O. Corporation Counsel of New York Says Charter Applies to Ferries.

New York, April 28.—Municipal ownership of street railways received another blow today when Corporation Counsel Delaney advised the board of estimates and appropriations that the city has no right to build a surface line.

The charter, says Mr. Delaney, gives the city power to own and operate ferries, but nowhere does it authorize the building and operation of transportation lines in the streets. A special act of the legislature conferring such power, he says, will be necessary to enable the city to build such a road.

STRIKERS LEAGUE WITH ANARCHISTS. Paris, April 27.—The labor agitation took a dramatic turn yesterday when the police, in order to unearth an alleged plot against the public security, searched offices of the labor federation and homes of the labor leaders, prominent royalists, Bonapartists and anarchists.

The suspects among the royalists and Bonapartists include Count Durand de Beauregard, Count de la Regle, General Baron de Tardel, M. Baccoumier, president of the Royalist Advance guard; M. Thouvenel, an intimate friend of Prince Louis Napoleon, and Major Feuilleul, formerly commander of the Imperial guard.

Bonapartists Gave Money. The results in many cases were negative. There is, however, official authority that documents were found which prove that royalists and Bonapartists intrigued with the labor leaders and liberally financed the revolutionary strike movements. Labor federations have refused to hand over its books to the police.

City Filling with Troops. The public has become more tranquil regarding May 1, owing to the completeness of the military and police precautions. The city is rapidly filling with troops, embracing thirty-nine battalions and forty-eight squadrons.

They have reintroduced at the Ecole Militaire and Galerie des Machines, which have been temporarily transformed into barracks. A significant decree has been published giving the right to a clerk in the requisition food and lodgings within the department of the Seine, beginning tomorrow.

DEADWOOD, S. D.—The towns of the Black Hills will soon be using wireless telegraph. O. C. Pfeiffer, representing the American De Forest Wireless Telegraph company, has arrived from Denver and promises to establish the system in a few weeks.

SAYS THE PASTOR WIGGLED HIS HIPS. Mrs. Grannis, Head of Purity League, on Trial Before Church Elders.

Mrs. Grannis was expelled from the church on West Fifty-sixth street last June by a vote of 141 to 6. She demanded a trial, and three unbiased elders were imported to act as judges.

Rev. Dr. B. E. Tyler, former pastor, came from Egypt to testify. Mrs. Grannis expected him to support her. Instead, he delivered this parting shot: "This good woman was at the head of the National Christian League for the Promotion of Purity, but I would call her league the league for the promotion of social nastiness."

The judges have not yet reached a decision.

20 IMMIGRANTS DEPORTED. New York, April 28.—Two hundred Hungarian, Greek and Montenegrin immigrants, who came to this country in response to advertisements for laborers at Madison, Wis., have been deported on the steamship Neapolitan Prince, because of an involuntary violation of the immigration laws, prohibiting the admission to the United States of persons who come here under such conditions.

MURDER SENT TO ASYLUM. Los Angeles, April 28.—Mrs. Kate Raymond, wife of a clerk in the interior department, Washington, and who several weeks ago asphyxiated her 14-year-old son, at Hollywood, has been committed to the asylum for the insane at Highland.

DEMOCRATS WIN IN RUSSIAN ELECTIONS

St. Petersburg, April 28 (2 a.m.).—Returns from the election are coming in, but the proportion of constitutional democrats chosen was overwhelming. Up to 2 o'clock this morning reports had been received from 63 of the 196 constituencies, out of which the Octoberists carried only three, the constitutional democrats and their Polish allies forty-six and the social democrats two, the remaining twelve being classified as independents. These last are probably in sympathy with the constitutional democrats.

The Father Gapon mystery has been further complicated by the reception Friday, by the former priest's lawyer, Margolin, of Father Gapon's portfolio containing important papers and the key to a box in deposit vaults. The portfolio was mailed at Berlin, the address being written in a disguised hand. No letter of explanation accompanied it.
