DEATH RATE GROWS. Figures for April Show Ravages of Many Diseases.

Advance figures from the monthly report of the health department show that there were approximately two hundred and sixty deaths in the city in April. This is greater than the figures for April, 1905, and the showing was somewhat unexpected in view of the absence of any serious epidemic. Typhoid shows twelve deaths; diphtheria, six, and measles, eleven. Pneumonia easily leads with thirty-five deaths, and tuberculosis is second with twenty-five. There were ten accidental deaths and six suicides.
