

TEN DEAD AFTER CRASH OF TRAINS

Fast Pennsylvania Passengers Meet Head-On Near Altoona - Dakotan Dying.

Altoona, Pa., May 5.—Ten persons are dead and nearly a score seriously injured as a result of the collision of two of the fastest mail and passenger trains on the Pennsylvania system on the Petersburg branch, near Clover Creek Junction, late last night.

The Chicago mail, westbound, and the Chicago & St. Paul, eastbound, sent around on the Petersburg branch to avoid the wreckage of a freight train on the main line, crashed together, head on, while going at full speed. Several cars were smashed and both engines twisted into scrap iron in an instant, by the terrific crash.

The following are the most seriously injured: Oscar Anderson of Velva, N. D., badly injured; die. Baggage-master, No. 21, Harrisburg, fractured skull, probably fatally injured. Fireman Cook, No. 18, of Harrisburg, leg fractured.

The disaster was indirectly due to a freight wreck on the middle division at 8:24 p.m. when twenty-seven loaded cars of an east-bound freight train were wrecked at Union Furnace, about twenty miles south of here, blocking all tracks.

In order to avoid detention of trains, passenger traffic was sent over the Petersburg branch. The Pennsylvania special, the eighteen-hour flyer westbound, was the first train to pass around and make the trip in safety.

No passengers on train No. 21 were killed. The passengers were caught under the wreckage by the piling up of mail-cars on the coaches. This made it impossible for those not injured to render any aid to those pinned down by the wreckage until the arrival of the wrecking forces.

Willmar, Minn., May 5.—The Jones clothing store was entered by burglars thru a rear window last night, and goods worth several hundreds of dollars were stolen. A horse and buggy were also stolen from Nels Tallakson, living two and one-half miles east of the city, and it is presumed the same men did both jobs.

LAWS LONG DEFIED IN SUGAR TRAFFIC

Flagrant Violations of Elkins Law Charged by Federal Jury Which Indicts.

New York, May 5.—The April federal grand jury has handed down seven sealed indictments in the sugar rebate cases. The indictments are against the following: The New York Central railroad, the Sugar Refining company, the New York Central & Hudson River railroad, Nathan Guilford, vice-president of the company.

The American Sugar Refining company of New York, and C. Goodlee Edgar and Edwin Earle, the latter two being wholesale sugar dealers of Detroit, Mich. The New York Central & Hudson River Railroad company and Nathan Guilford, vice president and F. L. Pomeroy, general traffic manager.

The first six indictments were found under the "Elkins anti-trust" law, which provides penalties of a fine not exceeding \$10,000, or imprisonment not exceeding two years, for giving, granting, applying for, or accepting any rebate, concession, or special freight rates, as published by a railway company as a common carrier.

Sees Other Violations. "But the evidence investigated by us bearing upon the indictments which we have found has incidentally revealed to us the existence of so many other instances of similar offenses as to indicate a general and systematic policy pursued by certain shippers, of exporting from the different railroads companies favors the legality of which is at least questionable. The evidence which has related mainly to shipments of various commodities in this locality to western markets.

Elkins Law Long Defied. "The evidence before us has shown clearly in several instances, and has indicated a fact quite generally, that the Elkins law as to the giving of rebates has been disregarded since the day of its enactment.

That body since last December has been largely occupied first with trying to defeat the bill outright, and when that failed, to be out of the question, with amending the bill with broad court review and other offensive features. Had this been the situation at the present moment, it might easily have been so far as predictions could have been made during the winter months, just imagine how all obstructions in the president's way would have been removed by the Garfield report and the special message of yesterday.

Helps Free Alcohol. Incidentally the free alcohol people are gathering much comfort from that part of the special message which addresses the passage of the bill which has already been passed. While it is too early to speak with certainty, it can hardly be mistaken in saying that the president's involvement in the free alcohol proposition, taken in connection with the Garfield exposure of the Standard Oil company, will help free alcohol more than anything that has thus far been done in its behalf.

NOT ALLISON AMENDMENT Rate Compromise Given Iowan's Name to Give It Strength. By W. W. Jernome. Washington, May 5.—It developed today that Senator Allison did not draft the amendment to the rate bill which carries his name, and objects to having his name drafted in the bill.

Victory for President. In the Allison amendment, which now has been accepted by the senate, President Roosevelt has won a great victory. This statement will be disputed perhaps by the conservative wing of the senate, but such a claim cannot be made until the bill is carefully scrutinized by the public before acceptance.

Congress to Sit Long. It is not known how much time will be occupied in passing upon pending amendments. Obviously, there being more than seventy amendments, it will be rather long, if there are to be speeches made pro and con on each of them.

PROBE IN INDIANA - Hoosier State to Investigate Rebate Charges in Garfield Report.

Indianapolis, May 5.—Taking the report of Commissioner of Corporations Garfield as the basis, the attorney general of Indiana has asked the state commission to investigate the charges that railroad companies gave secret rates to the Standard Oil company from its refinery at Whiting on shipments of oil to Evansville, these rates being greatly below the open or published rates that other shippers were compelled to pay.

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
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Women in Our Hospitals
