Destruction by Johnstown Flood is to Be Depicted at Wonderland

ONE of the new features at Wonderland park, which opens this season, Saturday, May 26, is to be a realistic representation of the Johnstown flood, which just at this time is vividly recalled in the San Francisco earthquake. Comparison of the horrors is naturally suggested.

Many bodies were, besides, known to have been cremated in the great pile of debris that banked up against a stone bridge. This wreckage took fire almost immediately after the flood and no one was near to assist, nor even see.

is thought, the head of every family would have received \$500, and all would have received all their personal losses. In this way the ordinary laboring man would have received from \$500 to \$1,000, and fewer would have received from \$2,000 to \$6,000.

Comparisons, too, are interesting as to the work of helping the survivors. Contributions to the relief of the flood sufferers in Minnesota cut \$27,340.14, about one-third of the amount that has been raised for San Francisco.

It was the bursting of a dam which held in check the waters of an artificial lake 400 feet above the town and fourteen miles distant, that overwhelmed Johnstown. The collapse was at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, when the waters of this lake, or pond, sixty feet deep on the average, a half mile wide and three miles long, bounded down the valley like a huge wall on rollers.

Some lessons from the relief of the sufferers might be applied in the case of San Francisco. For instance, a real estate was counted by the board of inquiry as practically a total loss, whereas real estate a year after the flood was worth as much as ever and has been increasing in value ever since.

When night settled down horror was added to the situation of the survivors by the wreckage taking fire at the great stone bridge of the Pennsylvania railroad, which withstood the flood. Many were cremated. The Catholic church being used as a temporary hospital to the losses. Under this plan, it
