City News

PARK BOARD AFTER FAMOUS LOOKOUT

TOWER HILL EVENTUALLY TO POSSESS A TOWER.

Prospect Park People Will Pay \$19,500 for New Acquisition—Members of Park Board Find Opinions Differ as to Building in Hennepin Avenue Matter.

Tower hill in Prospect Park is to be acquired by the park board for park purposes. At the meeting of the park commissioners yesterday a committee report that effect was presented. The revaluation provides for the payment to the owner of the property the sum of \$19,500 in certificates of indebtedness running ten years. This amount will be assessed against the property in the vicinity which will be benefited by the park.

Tower hill is the highest knoll in Prospect park and commands a view of the entire city. Some years ago it was surmounted by a wooden tower, but this has since been razed. It is likely that when the tower is able to be replaced by a stone observatory or lookout.

The plans of Theodore Wirth, superintendent of parks, for Wilson park, Irving triangle and Glen Gale were referred to the committee on improvements, with power to act. At the suggestion of Mr. Wirth, twenty-two caretakers were vested with authority as park policemen.

Differ as to Hennepin.

The Hennepin avenue matter was discussed at some length. C. J. Rockwood, attorney for the board, stated that, in accordance with the ruling of the district court, the board is under no legal obligation to maintain Hennepin avenue. This view was combated by Judge Daniel Fish and Judge F. C. Harvey, who declared that Mr. Rockwood was in error on an oral statement by Judge Andrew Holt, whereas the court, in its memorandum, had expressed the opinion that the board should continue to maintain that street.

ALL TO HEAR ARGUMENT

GOODHUE CASE SO IMPORTANT IT WILL BE PRESENTED TO WHOLE COMMISSION.

Arguments in the Goodhue and Pine Island cases before the interstate commerce commission will be made at Washington before the entire commission. Commissioner C. A. Prouty, who took the case, announced that the cases involved such a wide territory and such important principles that the entire commission would hear the argument. The grain rate from Goodhue and Pine Island to Chicago will not be reduced without also reducing it from other interior points in southeastern Minnesota. The towns on the river division of the Milwaukee enjoy a 12 1/2-cent rate, while those on the other lines pay 15 cents, and this differential is what they want removed.

Instead of closing the hearing with arguments being made yesterday, but to take testimony. When arguments are made, other roads will doubtless join with the Great Western, including the Milwaukee, North-Western and possibly the Minneapolis & St. Louis.

At the afternoon session yesterday, C. L. Anderson, a farmer near Goodhue, corroborated the testimony about advantage enjoyed by Red Wing in buying grain. The defense then presented its testimony. J. F. Diefenbach of the Simmons Milling company, Red Wing, declared that Red Wing advantage over Goodhue on No. 1 northern wheat was only 3 cents a hundred. It might be more on some of the lower grades. J. H. Hilland, third vice president of the Milwaukee road, said the river rates had been created by competition, and were based on certain pivotal points. The Minneapolis rate was governed by competition down the lakes. He said that the 12 1/2-cent rate would apply to Minneapolis if any grain originated there. As none does, the proportional rate of 7 1/2 cents is universally used. Commissioner Prouty said Mr. Hilland why Zumbrota could not have the same grain rate to Chicago as Red Wing, when each enjoys the 60-cent rate from Chicago, was the only witness. He testified that different factors entered into making the two rates. E. E. Watson, assistant general freight agent of the Great Western, testified along the same line as Mr. Hilland.

The Pine Island case was heard briefly, the same issues being presented there as in the Goodhue case. Judge Ira B. Mills and W. E. Young of the state railroad commission conducted the case for the complainants, and R. L. Cornwell, manager of the Pine Island Farmers' Elevator company, was the only witness. He testified that the grain rate from Pine Island to Chicago is 15 cents, and that the Great Western hauls grain from Red Wing through Pine Island on the 12 1/2-cent rate, being a violation of the long and short-haul clause.

WORKHOUSE TO BE PROBED

Ramsay County Grand Jury Takes Hand in St. Paul Row.

The grand jury of Ramsey county, which convened yesterday, will look into the St. Paul workhouse matter. Judge Fallam in charging the jury, reminded the jurymen that twice recently have prisoners escaped from the institution. Other matters in connection with the operations of the workhouse board, the court stated, make the subject one which the grand jury should investigate.

SNELLING CARS ROASTED

St. Paul Assemblymen Demand Ten-Minute Service to Form.

The St. Paul City Railway company had hard sledding at the session of the St. Paul assembly last night. The Snelling avenue car service was the topic of discussion. A number of assemblymen took occasion to roast the service, and the meeting ended with the passing of a resolution demanding a ten-minute service on the line from 7 a. m. to 11 p. m. C. C. Burdick, superintendent of the St. Paul lines, protested against the resolution, but his objections were of no avail.


