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LONDON, May 12.—What is calculated to create a bitter feeling between Roman Catholics and Protestants in England was the violence of the language used in the protest at the approaching marriage of Princess Ena to the king of Spain on the part of a large assembly of the clergy of the church of England, who had come from all parts of England to attend the annual meetings of the Protestant Reform Society.

Pittsburg, May 12.—Alexander Berkman, the anarchist who attempted to assassinate Henry C. According to local anarchists, Berkman will immediately take steps to assume the leadership of the anarchists in America, left vacant by the recent death of Johann Most. EDINBURGH IN THE QUAKE DANGERZONE

Seismographers Warn of Possible Destruction of City Built Upon Volcanoes.

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LONDON, May 12.—At the time of the San Francisco disaster certain seismographers expressed the opinion that the earthquake would in due course make its appearance on this side and that Edinburgh, which stands in the danger zone, being practically built upon extinct volcanoes would be visited. Well, the earthquake has been here from Devon, Cornwall and from the channel islands. From some parts of Scotland, but not Edinburgh, have some reports of how the earth has been quaking on different days this week.

RED WING PREPARED FOR MEMORIAL DAY. Strong Movement for Its Proper Observance—Somerville to Make Two Addresses.

Red Wing, Minn., May 12.—A committee, consisting of Superintendent N. K. Kunze of the Commercial club, N. K. Simmons of the city council, Major Oscar Sebach of the Spanish-American war veterans, Commander W. H. Blaker of the Grand Army and S. T. Irvine of the Sons of Veterans, was appointed some time ago to arrange for the proper observance of Memorial day. Senator George W. Somerville and Sleepy Eye, will deliver the address.

Methodism in India. Washington, D. C., May 12.—In Methodist churches throughout the country an observance will be held tomorrow of the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of Methodist work in India and a special offering will be taken with the object of raising a jubilee fund of \$250,000, with which Methodist effort in India will be practically doubled.

HYGIENIC EXPOSITION. Vienna, May 12.—The first great exhibition ever held with the sole purpose of displaying modern hygienic improvements was opened in Vienna today under the title of the "Universal Hygienic exposition." The exhibition is devoted to showing what has been accomplished in the fields of domestic and public sanitation, nutrition, sanitary and life-preserving work, and all other progress attained in matters pertaining to public and private hygiene. The exposition is held in a large building admirably adapted for the purpose, and is likely to be largely attended, during the two months it is open.

RAPID CITY SCHOOL UPLIFT FOR INDIANS

Practical Education Is Given the Young Wards of the Government.

Rapid City, S. D., May 12.—The faculty and students of the Indian school in this city are making preparations for their commencement exercises to be held early in June. This will close the ninth year for this institution. The school is especially fortunate in its situation. The farm of 300 acres is one of the best in the entire service. It is under irrigation, and apart from the knowledge and the service that it gives the students is really a paying proposition.

Work and Study. These pupils work half the day and study half the day. The boys are divided into two sections, as are also the girls. In the morning one section of the boys marches to the fields or the shops. It is the object of the school to train all their students so that they will not only know how to live, but also so that they will have the means of earning a livelihood. As all Indians are landowners, great stress is placed upon agricultural training for the boys.

Indian and Filipino Compared. Professor Mathews, who has recently accepted a position in this school, makes some interesting comparisons between the Indians and the Filipinos, whom he instructed for three years. He says the most apparent difference is the ease with which you can establish personal relations with the Filipino child in distinction to the natural reserve of the Indian child. The Filipino children are extremely polite, ready to speak and to enter into all the exercises of the classroom. The Indian child is more stolid, and it is often difficult to get them to talk.

Non-Reservation Schools. Superintendent J. F. House, who has been in the Indian service nineteen years, believes that the non-reservation schools are doing better than the reservation schools. The points in favor of the former are, he says, the fact that the discipline is better, the life broader and that the students come in contact with more people. No children are taken in at these schools without the consent of the parents, who have, however, the privilege of choosing the school to which the child will go, with the approval of the Indian agent.

Indian Instructors. There are two Indians among the instructors of this school. One Miss Fremont, the kindergarten and primary teacher, whose work is said to compare favorably with that of any teacher. The other is Chauncey Y. Babcock, the teacher of military tactics and athletics, and the assistant disciplinarian.

Rate Is Improving. Many proofs of the advance of the Indians in the last decade are to be found right here in Rapid City. They are also faithful to their work, and many of them can be seen every evening at sundown coming back to town with that emblem of modern plebeian life, the tin dinner-pail, in their hands.
