
Iowa City Commercial Club Has Eyes on Peoria.

Iowa City, Iowa, May 16.—A new electric interurban railway, linking Iowa City and Peoria, Ill., is a possibility. The Iowa City Commercial club took up the matter this morning, at the request of prominent citizens of Johnson, Iowa, and Poweshiek counties.

The present purpose is to link Iowa City and Montezuma, and in doing this, the old survey, made by the Des Moines, Iowa City & Eastern Railway company, which failed to build its proposed steam line, because of lack of funds, will possibly be followed. This survey ran from Des Moines to Peoria.

If Des Moines again takes active interest in the movement, as it did a few years ago, the enterprise may be extended in its scope, and Des Moines may be made the western terminus and Peoria the eastern. It is believed that a better opportunity to construct an electric line is presented than the promoters of the steam line ever faced.

The Iowa City club endorsed the movement emphatically and appointed Mayor George W. Ball and other prominent citizens a committee to meet representatives of all the other interested cities, to formulate plans for pushing the enterprise.
