AMERICANS THRIVE IN SOUTH AMERICA

MINNEAPOLIS MEN TELL EXPERIENCES IN ARGENTINE.

Practical Men are as Much There in Three Months as They Make Here in a Year—Land Has Odd Features. London Loss Bank for Cheapness.

Advantages and disadvantages of life in Argentina, South America, for a wide-awake American are entertainingly told by O. A. Johnson, mining partner of G. R. Nimmons, who yesterday returned from Buenos Aires. On the whole, Mr. Johnson concludes that while Argentina is a good country for a man who wants to make money fast, Minneapolis is in no danger of losing in population on that account. Minneapolis even has advantages over "good old London" in some respects. Mr. Johnson has found that practical men can earn more money net by working at their trades three months in Argentina, paying passage, than by working in the states a year.

What He Made. "I threshed grain ninety days," said Mr. Johnson today, "and was paid 100 pesos a month and 10 centavos a fanega. This means about \$43 in American gold and a cent and a quarter for every 222 pounds, or bushel of grain threshed. A man can make \$400 a month in gold in a good season. I threshed 75,000 bushels. Some men have made \$1,300, which netted them \$900 after traveling expenses. Mr. Johnson is in Hawley, Minn., until 1907, since which time he has made headquarters in Minneapolis. Last winter he worked 200 miles west and south of Buenos Aires, at Carlos, Casares. Buenos Aires is the largest shipping port in America, not excepting New York," he said today. "For ten miles up the river Rio Plate are the finest docks to be found and ships loading and unloading three abreast on either side. The docks are made of cut stone. Every thousand feet or so are drawbridges crossing the river. The docks are equipped with the latest machinery. The river is about 800 feet wide and will take boats of twenty-eight foot draught.

Rents Are High. "Real estate values are high in Buenos Aires. A bootblack and cigar stand, about 4 by 6 feet, rents for about \$60 a month. When I left the owner was talking about raising the rent \$10 a year. Large and new railroads sell for \$60 to \$75 an acre. "I have farmed in North Dakota and find that the Argentine land is not so rich as the Dakota land. After two or three crops of wheat the land has to be sown to alfalfa. The soil is a sandy loam.

Water Cuts Capers. "In the whole district of Buenos Aires I saw only two creeks. The railroads have to build no culverts or bridges, yet water is plenty. When we wanted water for our thrashing crew we simply drove an inch-and-a-half pipe five to ten feet and got plenty of water. On stock farms windmills are used to pump water to tanks. A peculiarity of the district is that wells four feet apart may have entirely different kinds of water. One may be fresh and the other salt. If the wind blows north from the sea the water would be fresh two or three days, but for a few days the water would turn salt, and we couldn't use it. Apparently, this did not affect the crops, but at times the stock won't drink the water.

Coming Shipping Port. "Bahia Blanca, 200 miles south of Buenos Aires, on the Atlantic coast, is the coming distributing point for larger ships. Six lines of road enter the city. "Americans have practically a monopoly of the business in harvesters, mowers and other agricultural implements. In the thrashing-machine line we still have the English to compete with, but we Americans are doing them as fast as we can. The thrashing machine company which leads obtained its foothold by sending down expert American men to the men of the Stinson boys of Morris, Minn. They sell machines, set them up and then watch their operation. When turned over to the natives the machines generally fail. Men's thrashing goods can be bought cheaper in Minneapolis than in London or New York, if the experience of Mr. Johnson is any criterion. He came home by way of London and began to outfit his Union suits that cost him \$4 in London sell for about 89 cents in Minneapolis, while the New York price is between the two. Mr. Johnson remains loyal to Minneapolis, but he will spend next winter in Argentina.

UNIONS HAVE 30,000 Membership in State Shows Increase of About 2,000. The state labor bureau is compiling statistics as to the membership of labor unions in the state, and most of the reports are in. If the present rate of increase continues, the total will be close to 30,000, or about 2,000 larger than last year. The membership in Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth is 24,000. About twenty small locals have dropped out of existence, but the rest have generally increased their membership.



At this juncture Governor Johnson arrived and was drafted by the Minnesota delegation. He made a ten-minute talk so effective that the friends of the other cities tried to stave

off a vote by adjournment, but Ralph Wheelock secured immediate action, and Minneapolis won.
