The Minnetonka Boat club is planning a busy season, and with the yachting events and the social affairs will give its members a variety of interesting diversions. As soon as Hotel Tonka Bay opens, a formal announcement of the opening ball of the club will be made. This will be some time during the latter part of June. E. Phinney is chairman of the new entertainment committee, and Fred Richter, James H. French and W. P. McDonald, C. E. Sampson are the other members.
