City News

CIVIC GATEWAY PLAN COMMENDED

PROMINENT CITIZENS DECLARE IT IS FEASIBLE.

Mayor Jones and Others Grow Enthusiastic in Discussing Mr. Bertrand's Suggestions and See No Reason Why They Should Not Be Carried Out in Detail.

Approval of the Bertrand plan for establishing a civic center in Minneapolis, as outlined in the Sunday Journal, is to be heard on every hand. Almost without exception commendation of the whole suggestion for improving the approach to the city from the union station is freely given. The full exposition of the suggestion, with its colored illustration and detail drawing, has aroused an enthusiasm for the beautification of the entry to the city and the establishment of a civic center, that has practically assured that ways and means for carrying out the scheme will be evolved at an early date.

One of the strongest arguments offered for the consummation of any good plan for making an approach to the business center, that shall always be a monument to the foresight of the citizens of today, is the fact that it will enhance the value of the lower part of the city and will make due return for any municipal expenditure that may be made.

Good Advertisement.

From an advertising standpoint, it is urged also, Minneapolis could not place a similar sum of money to better advantage, as the first impression that a stranger receives in entering the city, if unsatisfactory, is extremely hard to eradicate. Tours of the park system and an exhibition of the fine homes, the marvelous manufacturing district, and the substantial wholesale center, it is said, will have offset the picture that the surroundings of a union station present.

With the beautiful entrance for which Mr. Bertrand has made the plan, the city would not fail to make a good and everlasting impression on visitors, as well as to raise the city in the estimation of its own citizens.

Mayor Is Enthusiastic.

Interviews are almost monotonous in the approval of the plan along the lines suggested as well as the other. "Minneapolis must not forget that their city has passed the limits of a village and is now in metropolitan clothes," says Mayor David R. Jones. "We must improve our opportunities under the present favorable conditions, for they may not come again. Once we drift away from the splendid nucleus we now have it will be a difficult matter to get back. The present is the golden opportunity and Minneapolis should be thoroughly aroused on the subject."

I have not had an opportunity to study Mr. Bertrand's plan, but whether the entrance or plaza is made at Bridge square with a magnificent hotel on the site, the Nicollet house as a background, or further south with the courthouse and city hall as a background, is not a matter of great importance.

"We want a federal building and a new union station. The former should be the focus around which to work. Get the right location for it and prepare plans for the betterment of the city in connection therewith."

Need the Entrance.

Senator John F. Calhoun said: "The union station and city entrance plan, suggested in the Sunday Journal, is one that we need very much. It could be carried out just as well as not. It would improve all the property down that way and would really give value received, both to the city generally and to those who own the property involved. If they are not able to pay for it themselves, all the other property holders ought to help for the time being. It is an improvement that ought to be made."

Andrew Rinker, city engineer, said: "Mr. Bertrand's plan for the improvement of the city is a worthy one. Commendation and should secure the approval of all citizens. That part of the city has been going backward for a score of years and this retrogression could be stopped by some plan as has been proposed. The removal of the old city hall and the old buildings in Center block for the creation of a plaza would be a distinct gain to the city. The expense would be considerable, but the benefits would soon return to the city."

ST. PAUL GIVES UP FORT TO MINNEAPOLIS

As far as the present St. Paul city council is concerned, Fort Snelling is formally surrendered to Minneapolis because the street railway company will not grant St. Paul a 5-cent fare to Minneapolis. The proposed bond issue of \$100,000 for St. Paul's share on the proposed new bridge across the Mississippi at Fort Snelling was considered yesterday by the council committee on streets, which also has under consideration the Rohland ordinance demanding the Minneapolis 5-cent fare in return for the passage of the bond ordinance. The measures were laid over and it is doubtful if they will be revived in the life of the present council.

The new council will be in office June 5 and it is believed that the new body will revive the bond ordinance and kill the Rohland resolution. The business interests of St. Paul are aroused by the fear that delay will mean that all the post trade will turn to Minneapolis before a new bridge can be secured. The St. Paul Commercial club has urged action yesterday, but its resolution was turned down. Other organizations will bring pressure to bear on the new council and demand action.

As far as Minneapolis and the street railway people are concerned, St. Paul can stay out as long as it wants to. On the Fort Snelling-St. Paul line each city would have a 5-cent fare to any part of the reservation reached by the line. On the Lake street interurban line the intermediate 5-cent district is to be the same as at present, between Snelling avenue and the river. St. Paul passengers crossing the bridge must pay a second fare, and Minneapolis passengers crossing Snelling avenue must pay a second fare.

CIRCUS DAY TOMORROW WITH MORNING PARADE
