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
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CASTRO JUST WON'T RESUME PRESIDENCY

Caracas, Venezuela, May 26.—Taking advantage of the fact that today is the anniversary of the restoration, when, as a victorious general, he entered Venezuela at the head of his army, former President Castro published a proclamation entitled "An Offering to My Fatherland," in which he announced that he had decided permanently to retire to private life and sacrifice his personality to save his party and the nation.
