ADOLPH OLSEN'S BENEFIT

Adolph Olsen, the violinist, for whose benefit a very successful concert was given at the Swedish Temple last evening, is one of the most promising of the musicians who have grown up and received their initial impetus along musical lines in this city. He possesses the three qualifications without which success is impossible; he is thoroughly musical; he possesses the artistic sense in a marked degree; he also possesses that elusive thing called temperament, which enables him to reach the heart with his music.

In the concert last evening young Olsen was rightly given the lion's share to do, and his work called for keen and insistent applause. The Swendens "Romance" was capably played, with a full round tone and a splendid interpretation. The Kolar-Bain "Son of the Sea" with its bizarre Shavian treatment, called for much technique, and was played with a freedom and incisiveness that was very grateful.

For his other numbers Mr. Olsen played a composition of his teacher, F. M. Christiansen, a "Serenade," and De Beriot's "Sixth Concerto," the latter calling for a large measure of equipment, and in none of them did the young artist fall short of the high standard which characterized his first number. Miss Enalite Cheneyver played his accompaniments in admirable style.

Maud Ulmer Jones gave a group of songs, of which Miss San Souci's "Where Blossoms Grow" was easily the best both in point of composition and rendition. The composer accompanied Mrs. Jones. Jacob L. Hjort sang two songs, both of which were admirably suited to his voice, and his singing was artistic and thoroughly enjoyable. The Normaendenes Sangforening, under the direction of Erik Oulie, sang two numbers. Both compositions were good and well directed. The club, which has not appeared as frequently as might have been wished during the past season, sang with unusually good effect.


