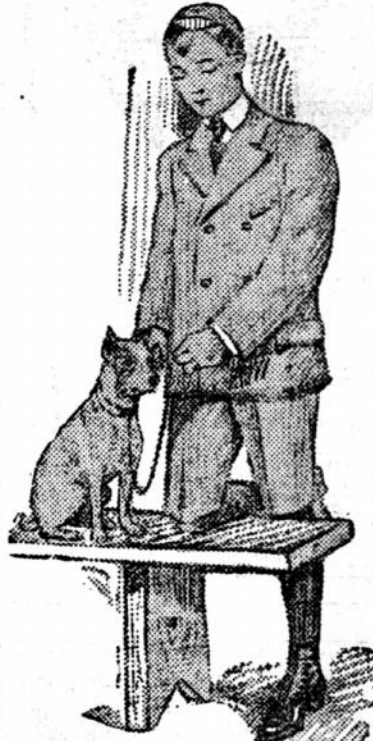

### SHOOTING AT BELTRAMI

Injured Man Says 'Twas Accidental—Officers Hold Contrarwise.

CROOKSTON, MINN.—J. Conter, a colored barber and laundryman in the town of Beltrami, twenty miles south of this city, came near meeting his death Tuesday at the hands of Louis Gilson, a farmer living near the same town. The two had been drinking together at Gilson's

home, and later Conter started for his laundry. Gilson followed with his shotgun and, entering the colored man's place of business, began to flourish the weapon playfully. It went off and Conter received a portion of the charge in his chest.

Sheriff Conner of this city was telephoned and, going to Beltrami, placed Gilson under arrest. He was brought here and released on \$5,000 bonds. The colored man was also locked up, as it was believed he was about to leave the vicinity. He asserts that the shooting was merely accidental, and bears no malice against

Gilson. The authorities take a different view of the case, however, and will bring it before the next grand jury.

### TRAIL LOST MAN TO RIVER

N. S. ARTMAN BELIEVED TO HAVE PERISHED WHILE HUNTING IN THE MOUNTAINS.

Special to The Journal. Sand Point, Idaho, June 1.—Bloodhounds were used in the search for N. S. Artman, a former Butte man, who disappeared while on a hunting trip in the mountains a few miles from Troy.

Harry Draper, who owns two valuable hounds, passed thru here yesterday for his home in Spokane, having abandoned his efforts to find the missing man. The dogs followed Artman's footprints to a river where it is supposed he was drowned.

Artman started on a hunting trip, taking his gun and some provisions. He failed to return in a reasonable time and search was made for him. This being unavailing, Draper's bloodhounds were called into requisition.

The hounds found his trail and followed it to the York river where it empties into the Kootenai. The footprints seemed to enter the river at this point and the theory is that Artman was drowned. It is believed he became deranged and committed suicide by drowning.

### THREE HURT IN RUNAWAY

Farmer's Team Made a Spurt in Town—All in Wagon Thrown to Street.

WATERLOO, IOWA.—Three persons were badly hurt as the result of a runaway on the east side of the river yesterday. John Kurt, a farmer, was badly bruised; his wife is injured internally, and Miss Elinger, 10 years old, the adopted daughter of the pair, sustained a broken leg and numerous bruises.

The Kerts were riding on a spring seat, placed on top of a high box. The team was frightened by a drayman, with a heavy loaded truck, who approached from behind. The horses attached to Kurt's wagon started on a mad gallop down East Sixth street toward the river. By the lurching of the vehicle Mrs. Kurt and the girl were thrown to the pavement. Kurt held to the reins, but when the wagon struck a rut he too was thrown out.

The horses continued down Water street, and ran into F. P. Murphy's grocery, breaking a large plate glass window.
