PEERLESS LINE SOLD

American Colonization Association Will Use Road to Boom Lands.

Washburn, Wis., June 2.—Upon what is considered reliable authority, the report is made that the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Ashland road, better known to the people of the northern part of the state as the "Peerless Line," has just been sold to the American Colonization association of Chippewa Falls, and the road, which of late years was used by the Edward Hines Lumber company of Chicago and the Weyerhaeuser people of St. Paul for the purpose of hauling timber, will be converted into a passenger and freight line, connecting Ashland and Washburn with the towns on the south shore of Lake Superior. The company that has just purchased the line has immense holdings of out-crover lands in the northern part of Bayfield county which they are desirous of putting upon the market, and it is their intention to bring large colonies of settlers to their lands.

The price paid for the road, it is said, was \$4,000 a mile, or \$160,000. The road will boom the towns along the lake, and it is expected that there will be a large influx of people to that territory.

WILL RUSH CONSTRUCTION

Owners of Yellowstone Park Road Anxious to Reach Mines.

Special to The Journal. The early completion of the Bear Creek branch of

F. A. Hall's Yellowstone Park railroad is now in sight.

The owners of the great coal mines at Bear Creek, who have already put in nearly \$100,000 in improvements, and machinery, have been anxious to see the road completed so that they could commence mining and shipping coal. It is understood that they insisted that Mr. Hall should make better progress with the laying of rails.

The directors of the coal company met Mr. Hall in Billings and in their conference, financial arrangements were completed for the immediate purchase of 1,200 tons of rails from a Chicago firm. The rails were ordered by telegraph, with instructions to ship at once. It will require forty-five cars to convey the steel, which is now on the way.
