Tomorrow Macalester college closes another year's work, graduating a class of twelve. The commencement exercises will be held in the college auditorium, and the address will be given by Rev. Dr. J. G. K. McClure, president of McCormick theological seminary, Chicago. The members of the class are: Levi H. Beeler, James E. Detweiler, James Hamilton, Roscoe C. Following the commencement exercises will come the annual meeting and dinner of the alumni association, at which the speakers will be Rev. Dr. James Wallace, president of the college; Rev. Dr. A. B. Marshall, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Minneapolis, who is now conducting the campaign for an endowment for the college; Rev. W. H. Humphrey of the class of '90, now of Ashland, Wis.; Miss Doig of one of the recent classes, and others. The after-dinner talks will be interspersed with college songs by the alumni and with solos by Professor H. E. Thompson of the music department. The annual recital and graduation exercises of the music department will take place this evening at the college. The program will be given by the graduates in music, who are: Paul T. Rusterholz, Carmen B. Mahlum, Charris Robertson and Pearl Neeb, who have taken courses in voice culture, and Mildred G. Phillips, a student of the piano.

Last evening were given the annual class exercises, consisting of music by Miss Hope's orchestra, the class prophecy by Mr. Rusterholz, and Mr. Thompson's presentations by Rev. Hood; the class will, by Mr. Thompson; Irish songs, by Mr. Rusterholz, and William Butler Yeats' Irish folk songs play, "Land of Heart's Desire." The cast was: Maurten Bruin, Mr. Higbee; Shawn Bruin, Mr. Troop; Father Hart, Mr. Detweiler; Bridge Bruin, Miss Swasey; Miss Hope, Miss Turnbull; the faerie, Miss Hyslop.

The play was presented under the direction of Miss Whitridge, and was well played and well staged, and proved of absorbing interest. The attendance was large and the "grinds" in the first half of the program were hugely appreciated. Sunday the annual drama was presented at Macalester Presbyterian church by Rev. T. F. M. Clark, '95, now of St. Croix Falls, Wis. In the afternoon Dr. Wallace gave the biennial address at the college, and in the evening Rev. Dr. P. M.
