

Journal Cadet Regiment Reorganizes and Takes Up Drill with Model Guns

Because of Weather and Many Distractions Progress for Week Is Slow—Col. Sprague Urges Importance of Company and Regimental Drills—List of New Promotions and Appointments.

Now that the Journal cadets have had a week's drill in the manual of arms, it is largely a matter of practice to acquire experience in handling the guns. To secure this, drills must be regularly attended. It is expected that each cadet will attend his weekly company drill, but should he miss it, special drills, irrespective of companies, will be held Friday and Saturday afternoons, as noted in the drill schedule, which he can attend, or he may attend the drill of another company. But drill once a week, at least, he must, unless sickness or absence from the city prevents. Next Friday afternoon, June 15, the cadets will be taken to Fort Snelling to see the regimental drill of the Twenty-eighth United States Infantry. It is hoped that they will be able to make a creditable appearance by that time in the eyes of the regular soldiers. The drill of the regulars will serve as a good object lesson. The Journal will provide transportation, so there will be no expense attached to the trip. Cars will be loaned the army campus at 3 o'clock. The Journal has also arranged to give the cadets an afternoon at Wonderland amusement park the week of July 1, when they will be provided with tickets to the various attractions. It is intended to have then a competitive drill in the manual of arms to take place on the platform, and the members of the company best acquiring itself will be given as prizes handsome badges. An individual competition to decide the best drilled cadet in the regiment will follow, for which a handsome prize will be offered. Colonel Sprague will also offer a gold medal as a prize to the captain of a company showing the best percentage of attendance at drills, company efficiency to be taken into consideration. These competitions are only to be open to cadets who attend drills regularly. Absence without sufficient excuse for a single week will disqualify. As explained, a cadet who misses drill will be allowed to make it up by attending another drill the same week. Rolls will be completed Monday evening at regimental headquarters, and will be carefully kept. It is especially important therefore that every cadet should attend Monday night's drill. If rain prevents it will be postponed to Tuesday night. Schedule of Drills. The following is a schedule of the week's drills at armory campus:



Jubilee, Iowa, June 9.—Two miles of wedding guests followed Mr. and Mrs. Albert Wendell from the church where they were married to the house of an aunt of the bride, where the wedding festivities were in progress. Two hundred more joined the party in the evening and dancing, feasting and merry-making continued until morning. Among the guests were persons from Oklahoma, Wisconsin, Illinois, the Dakotas, Minnesota and all parts of Iowa. The list of wedding presents was amazing in the number, variety and costliness. The bride's name was Miss Anna A. Dora.

The divorce was granted on statutory grounds, and Mrs. Heyworth was the principal witness against the defendant. Detectives gave the testimony regarding the alleged escapades of the defendant. As had been predicted Heyworth made no defense. Mrs. Heyworth is said to have waived all financial claims in consideration of having the custody of her children.
