

PITCHERS GETTING INTO SUMMER SHAPE

Marked Decline This Week in the Heavy Hitting of Batters.

Charley Carr got tired of doing all the batting for the Hoosiers and slumped off to .352 as a result of which our old friend Sutor Sullivan becomes the leading batter among the regulars, holding that honor for the third week during this season. Sutor has an average of .424 in the last sixteen games, which is pretty fair hitting.

Our own Denny Sullivan comes up into fourth place and 'Lefty' Davis is well up in the .300 class this week. Carr, Green and Geier all fell off badly the past week, while Waldron, Cassidy, and two Sullivan, Burke and Abbott, slumped very consistently. The pitchers are getting in mid-season form and the heavy hitters show it.

There are twenty-five men in the 300 class. Louisville has six of these, Kansas City and St. Paul five each, Toledo three, Minneapolis and Milwaukee two each, and Indianapolis and Columbus one each. The batting average is .352. O'Leary has .255 and Shannon, Kilroy and Fox are tied with .192.

One year ago today there were twenty-two men in the .300 class and four of those twenty-two men are in the .300 class today—Demott, Davis, Hallman and Kerwin. Cy Oulter led the association a year ago today with an average of .351. Today his average is .208.




