City News

POINTERS FROM CHICAGO

IMPROVEMENT LEAGUE HEARS MRS. BOLTE ON CITY-BEAUTIFUL WORK, AND IS ADDRESSED BY MAYOR.

Mayor David P. Jones and Mrs. Jessie Willard Bolte, second vice president of the Woman's club of Chicago, addressed the meeting of the Improvement league yesterday afternoon. Mr. Jones encouraged the league to persevere in its crusade against untidy streets and yards. Much good work had been accomplished, but there were still many spots which needed attention, and the cause should not be allowed to peter thru lack of interest.

Mrs. Bolte spoke at some length of the work of the Woman's club of Chicago, which had an income of \$20,000 a year and was a potent factor in promoting civic reform. It had inaugurated and successfully managed several important improvements.

Interesting reports were received from the chairman of the ward committees. With the co-operation of the aldermen, street commissioners and school children, many unsightly places had been beautified. Property owners had taken a personal interest in making their places neat and keeping them in that condition. Nevertheless, many back yards were still in a disgraceful condition, indicating that some citizens were in need of further education.

The gift of \$100 from "a well-wisher" was gratefully acknowledged. It is suggested that the money be distributed as prizes for some particular line of civic improvement. The plan will be more fully outlined at a later meeting of the league.

One of the measures which the league will inaugurate is the removal of advertising placards and posters from telephone and other poles. It is against the law to deface a pole in any manner, and any person, young or old, is authorized to tear down and remove such signs. It is suggested that the children would be interested in this movement and would remove all offending signs without much encouragement.

MARKET GARDENERS GO ON PICNIC, 1,200 STRONG

Twelve hundred of the market gardeners and their families took a train today for Sturgis park, Buffalo, where the market gardeners always hold their picnic. The affair today was the thirtieth annual outing. The transportation committee was made up of D. M. Hamilton, W. H. Boffending and E. E. Howe, and they procured a special train to carry the crowd.

A long line of amusement features was in charge of President N. H. Reeves and the committee, L. J. Norris, H. Dahners and Fred Virtue. Cash prizes were given in profusion for the various events. The events were a ball game, running and standing jump and 100-yard dash for men; 100-yard dash for boys; egg race, potato race and 50-yard dash for women, and 50-yard dash for girls. Barring the tug of war, interest centered in a twine-winding contest and a nail-driving contest for women.

The dance program was a long one and waltz prizes were given for gardeners only, for men and for women. Potter's band and orchestra were taken along. The train will start back from Buffalo at 7 p.m.

PREPARE FOR PICNIC

Catholic Parishes Name Executive Committee to Work Out Details.

All the Catholic parishes in the city will join in a monster Fourth of July celebration to be held at Nelson's grove, Penn and Plymouth avenues N. At a meeting last evening representatives from sixteen parishes were present, and a general executive committee was organized with the following officers: Chairman, W. P. Devereux; secretary, F. E. Murphy; treasurer, Hubert Kelly. The purpose of the picnic, held from commemorating the day, is to raise funds for the pro-cathedral.

It is planned to entertain fully 20,000 persons at the picnic. This is feasible, as the grove is at the terminus of the Plymouth avenue line and is within easy walking distance of the Sixth avenue N and other lines.

The program will include various athletic sports, a ball game, games for the children, and music. The A. O. U. W. band will be in attendance all day. In the evening there will be fireworks.

St. Paul Policeman Has Odd Experience in Chasing Tramps.

Patrolman Hoefler of the Margaret street police station, St. Paul, had a narrow escape from drowning yesterday. He was engaged in rounding up some tramps in the Burlington yards. Some new made land near the river edge gave way with his weight and he fell up to his neck in water and soft mud. Patrolman Mattson managed to hold Hoefler up till Detectives Werrick and Ryan arrived on the scene and with a rope pulled Hoefler out of his perilous position.
