

## LE CLAIRE HAS BIG FIRE

Loss on Its Stores and Blocks Is \$115,000. Davenport, Iowa, June 13.—The business section of Le Claire, Iowa, was burned yesterday. The buildings destroyed include the largest hotel, the Knights of Pythias hall and several stores. Loss \$150,000 on buildings; \$10,000 on stocks; partly covered by insurance.

## WHITE EARTH LANDS OPENED TO WHITES

### Indian Appropriation Bill Contains Important Provisions for Minnesota.

Washington, June 13.—The Indian appropriation bill which was finally acted upon by the house yesterday carries some of the most important legislation affecting the Chippewas of Minnesota enacted since the Morris bill became a law. One amendment put in the bill in the senate will result in opening up the White Earth reservation to white settlers. It provides that all trust patents issued to mixed bloods on the reservation shall have full force and effect of fee patent, carrying with it the right to sell land now tied up. It is said that under this provision, 1,300 Indians will be enabled to sell their holdings. As fullbloods, they are to receive fee patents, when the secretary of the interior is satisfied that they are capable of managing their own affairs. The second amendment extends the time when purchasers of Red Lake lands shall make the prescribed payments, by one year. Another amendment, of interest in all the Indian country, provides that no land acquired under the provisions of the general allotment act shall become liable to the satisfaction of any debt contracted prior to the issue of the final patent, and that no money accruing from any lease or sale of lands held in trust for any adult or minor Indian, shall become liable for any debt contracted during the trust period, except with the approval and consent of the secretary of the interior. Provision is made for the transfer of Cooper island, known locally as Star Island, in Cass lake, to the state of Minnesota for park purposes, with the provision that the state shall be bound to the state upon terms to be agreed upon between the secretary of the interior and the governor. An appropriation of \$15,000 is made for drainage investigation on Indian lands in the state. The above provisions are in addition to the ordinary appropriations for the maintenance of schools and carrying out treaty obligations with the Chippewas.

## 'WHO IS BISHOP POTTER?' ASK BRITISH DIPLOMATS

Journal Special Service. Washington, June 13.—'Who is Bishop Potter?' was the British embassy's reply when inquiry was made there today as to what view was taken as to the bishop's observations that 'there is no lost love between Great Britain and America.'

Neither Ambassador Durand nor his attaches were willing to talk for publication, but it was hinted at the embassy that the bishop's remarks should not be taken too seriously and that in the opinion of the British diplomats the friendship between Great Britain and the sympathy of England was shown during the Spanish war when the English squadron lined up alongside Dewey's fleet at a critical time in Manila. The loss of the British and American naval men the world over whenever opportunity afforded was also cited.

## WHITE-ROBED NOVICE DROWNS IN MISSISSIPPI

St. Louis, June 13.—Standing on the river bank in the grounds of the Notre Dame convent, a mile south of Carondelet, a young girl, clad in the white robe of a novice in the Sisterhood, stood poised for a moment in the light of this morning sun and then, with a last prayer on her lips, jumped into the Mississippi river. Efforts to recover the body have been unavailing. The sorrowing members of the Sisterhood tried to find the body, but would not give out the name of the novice until her parents in St. Charles are notified. The girl was known as Sister Editha. Before entering the order her name was Martha Deckerte of St. Charles, Mo.

## FIRE AT LUOK, WIS HOOP AND EXCELSIOR MILL OF PAULSON BROTHERS IS IN RUINS.

Special to The Journal. Osceola, Wis., June 13.—The hoop and excelsior mill of Paulson Brothers at Luok, Wis., was burned at 8:30 o'clock last night. A barrel of oil had been placed so near the boilers that it exploded and scattered fire all over the premises. Thirty-five tons of excelsior were destroyed. The loss is \$6,000; no insurance. The contract for the construction of cement sidewalks in Osceola has been let to Car Otis & Co. of Lindstrom, Minn. The work will be started at once. Anton V. Newman and Miss Minnie Hillekotter, both of Osceola, were married yesterday.

## MOB SLAYS A NEGRO Citizens Kill Prisoner as Officers Are Taking Him Away.

Pocomoke City, Md., June 12.—Ned Watson, colored, last night was taken from the authorities by a mob and shot to death here. He had murderously assaulted his employer, Samuel S. Barnes, near Kings creek, Somerset county. Watson was caught near the railroad station here about 8 p.m., and also a mob bent on lynching him gathered very quickly, he was hustled to jail by officers. About 10:30 p.m. the officers tried to smuggle Watson on a train, intending to take him to Princess Anne for safety. They were detected in the attempt by the mob, however, and their prisoner was shot to death.
