Railroads ELEVATOR CHARGE QUESTION OF LAW

ATTORNEYS WILL SETTLE MATTER FOR RAILWAYS.

Officials of Western Roads Believe that Absorption of Charge Is in Effect the Same as Paying a Rebate—Trans-Missouri Grain Situation Is Basis of Controversy.

Chicago, June 13.—Whether the practice of absorbing elevator charges at the Missouri river on not pass thru the elevators at the Missouri river, but that the attention of the executive officials of western roads at a meeting held here yesterday. After much discussion, it was decided to refer the problem to the legal departments of the various roads and their decisions will direct the ultimate action.

The question of the legality of absorbing the elevator charges was brought up by the accusation that some shipments of grain do not pass thru the elevators at the Missouri river, but that the allowance for elevation is frequently made, which really operates as a rebate.

Like a Rebate. As this charge is similar to a switching charge, it has always been considered a part of the expense incident to the transmission of the grain and has been paid out of the regular freight rates. But now the question is raised that the elevator companies, not being common carriers, are not entitled to this money when it comes from the freight rate.

DISPATCHERS GO TO MITCHELL Milwaukee Road Makes Changes in Operating Forces.

Mitchell, S. D., June 13.—The Milwaukee road has made the first move toward establishing more prominent division headquarters in this city. The train dispatching force, which has been at Sarnob, Iowa, for a great many years, has been transferred to Mitchell. This force on the Iowa and Dakota division numbers the chief dispatchers and three trick men.

BOND DEAL CLOSED Wisconsin Central Finances New Duluth Line.

New York, June 13.—The Wisconsin Central road has sold to a syndicate composed of Brown Brothers, Maitland, Coppel & Co., Edward M. Sweet, Co., and George A. Fernald & Co., \$7,000,000 Wisconsin Central, Superior & Duluth division and terminal, first mortgage, 30 year, 4 per cent gold bonds.

NEW NORTH-WESTERN LINE Wolf River Valley Road Will Connect Important Branches.

Madison, Wis., June 13.—The Wolf River Valley Railroad company has filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The line will be constructed from Grandon to a point in a southeasterly direction in Shanona county to connect with the Marquette, Green Bay & North-Western. The estimated length is seventy-one miles and the capital stock is \$100,000.

800 BEGINS GRADING Big Job is Ahead to Prepare St. Paul Terminals.

The Soo has begun work on its terminals at St. Paul. Although the grading is to be pushed rapidly, it is likely that nothing will be done with the freight house property at Seventh and Klason streets until the tunnel under the Northern Pacific and Great Northern tracks is finished.
