MINNESOTA CAN'T HEAR KANSAS' CRY FOR HELP

HE IS SPECIALLY PLEASED WITH THE PLANKS ON MORALITY AND GOOD GOVERNMENT.

Mayor David P. Jones is much pleased with the work of the republican convention at Duluth, with the nominations made and particularly with the platform. He says:
