Keene's Great Racer a Victim of Blood Poisoning

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New York, June 18.—James R. Keene's 4-year-old colt Sycosny, conceded last year to be the best horse in training in America, died yesterday in his stall at the Sheepshead Bay racetrack of blood poisoning.

As a 2-year-old Mr. Keene was offered and refused \$100,000 for his colt, whose only defeat in his racing career was in the Futurity of 1904.

The colt was stabled by the famous English stallion Melton, who was bred to the mare Optima.

The horse will be buried at Sheepshead Bay, but later in the season will be disinterred and shipped to the States to be buried beside Mr. Keene's other famous horse, Domino.
