


RARE BOOKS FOR AUGSBURG SCHOOL

Battle Lake, Minn., June 18.—Prof. Andrew Hellan, of Augsburg seminary has announced to the Free church convention that he has secured for that institution a library of 5,000 volumes from H. C. Hegqvist of Norway.

Rev. Messrs. I. Mortenson, B. Hogbo and J. Mattson were appointed to collect funds for paying the \$6,000 debt of Augsburg.

Sunday's service, always the banner one, was attended by about 1,500 persons. One hundred and seventy-five partook of the Lord's supper. Rev. Messrs. S. Rislov and E. Aas breaking the bread. After the morning's sermon by Rev. J. Mattson an offering of \$245 was taken, the pilgrims' chorus from "Tannhauser" being given as the offertory.

In the afternoon came the ordination of the two candidates for the ministry, O. J. Raauw and C. N. Vogt. Rev. Paul Winther of Minneapolis read the vitan of the candidates. The ceremony of ordination was conducted by Rev. I. Tollefson, rector of the Minneapolis deaconess institute, assisted by Pastors L. A. Kjelnaas, O. Dahle, Chr. Jorgenson, P. Stoen and E. Harbo. Mr. Vogt goes to Clintonville, Wis., and Mr. Raauw to Perham, Minn., to enter upon pastoral duties. An offering of \$155 was taken for home missions.

The evening service, which week have been given over to evangelistic meetings and not a few have professed conversion.

CONSULAR CHANGES TO AFFECT NORTHWEST MEN

Washington, June 18.—The president has sent a number of notable nominations to the senate of some which affect northwestern men.

The most important is the change at Montreal, Canada, where Major A. W. Edwards of Fargo, N. D., is let out, and Church Howe of Nebraska appointed to succeed him. Major Edwards' health has been so poor for some time that he has been unable to perform the duties of office, and the department officials say it is a question whether he should have been appointed at all.

The officials recognize the North Dakotan's ability and express regret that change had to be made. Edward H. Ozman of St. Paul is transferred from consul at Stuttgart, Germany, to be consul general at Constantinople, a deserved promotion based on his good record.

William C. Macgillisen of Minnesota was nominated to be consul at Bagdad, Turkey. Journal readers will recall that Macgillisen was shot at a notable point in the war in Syria, where he was acting as vice consul.

Robert S. S. Bergh of North Dakota is transferred from the consularship at Copenhagen to be consul at Dusseldorf, Germany.

G. B. Ravendall of South Dakota, now consul at Dawson, Canada, is sent back to his old post at Beirut, Syria, where he had previously served for a number of years. Milton M. Price of South Dakota is promoted from consular agent to consul at Jerez de La-Frontera, Spain.

PLUNGER AT ROULETTE

"NO," DECLARES SCHWAB

London, June 18.—Charles H. Schwab, former president of the steel trust, accompanied by Mrs. Schwab, has sailed for America. Before leaving London he took occasion to deny stories which have been published in regard to his play for high stakes at Monte Carlo.

"It is not true that I risked enormous sums at roulette as some persons would have the public believe," he said. "I have been over here solely for the benefit of my health. I did visit Monte Carlo, but my losses or winnings were not much either way."

"It has been reported that at one time your available supply of money became so low that you were compelled to play with five franc pieces," said the correspondent.

"That doesn't seem at all likely, does it?" he remarked.

"The possibility of his running short of money seemed to amuse his immensely. Mr. Schwab would not deny that he had played the maximum on the wheel on several occasions.

Mr. Schwab's health is much improved.

Wood, of the Village of Minnetonka, praying for the location of a certain alley in said village running easterly from the southerly end of Hubert's boulevard to the southerly end of the "Subdivision of Lot 17, Northwood," according to the plan thereof recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds within and for the County of Hennepin and State of Minnesota, along and north of lots one (1), seven (7) and eight (8) in "Huntington's Point, Lake Minnetonka," and along and south of lots ten (10) and eleven (11) in "Huntington's Point, Lake Minnetonka," and Northwood," according to the respective plans thereof on file in the office of the Register of Deeds within and for said Hennepin County.

And whereas, said petitioners pray for the location of such alley in said village, and said lot twelve (12), Northwood, and lots seven (7) and eight (8), Huntington's Point, Lake Minnetonka, and lot ten (10) and eleven (11), Northwood, if extended over and across said alley.

Resolved, that the petition be considered and said petitioners and all of them interested therein heard at a meeting of the Village Council to be held in and for the Village of Minnetonka on Monday, the 26th day of July, 1906, at 7 o'clock p. m., at which meeting notice thereof be given to all parties concerned therein by posting notice of said hearing at least one week prior to said meeting, and that a copy of this ordinance be filed in the office of the Register of Deeds within and for the County of Hennepin and State of Minnesota, for the purpose of being recorded in the Register of Deeds within and for said Hennepin County.

And whereas, said petitioners pray for the location of such alley in said village, and said lot twelve (12), Northwood, and lots seven (7) and eight (8), Huntington's Point, Lake Minnetonka, and lot ten (10) and eleven (11), Northwood, if extended over and across said alley.

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AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING STREETS, SIDEWALKS AND ALLEYS, AND TO PREVENT THE LOCATION OF STREETS AND ALLEYS IN VIOLATION OF THE SAME.

The Village Council of the village of Minnetonka, in and for the County of Hennepin and State of Minnesota, do hereby enact and ordain that:

Section 1.—No person or persons shall make any excavations in any of the streets, avenues, alleys, highways or public places in said village for any purpose, or remove the earth or soil from any such excavation, or erect any obstruction of any kind therein, until he shall first be specially authorized to do so by resolution of two of the trustees of said village, which permission shall be in writing or partly in writing and partly in print, and filed with the Village Council, and shall, when the excavation or obstruction is made, be such as to protect persons or animals from being injured by falling into or upon the same, and every person making such excavation or obstruction shall place and maintain during the hours between sunset and sunrise suitable signs of red lights on said excavation, and warn the general public of the existence of such excavation or obstruction, and shall, when the purpose of such excavation or obstruction are accomplished, or when so ordered by the Village Council, without delay fill up or remove the same so that it shall be in at least as good condition as at the time of the issuance of said permit.

Section 2.—If any person shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance he shall, on conviction thereof before the justice of the peace in said village, be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars, and costs of prosecution, and in default of the payment of such fine and costs of prosecution he shall be imprisoned in the village lock-up or in the common jail of Hennepin county for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days.

Section 3.—This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the date hereof, and shall remain in force until the passage of a new ordinance in lieu thereof.
