OIL TRUST GRIP ON MUTUAL CLINCHED

Rogers' Slate Gives Standard Control of Company's Millions, Trustee Says.

Journal Special Service. New York, June 19.—Despite the effort of President Peabody to keep the fact secret, it has become known, thru a prominent trustee of the Mutual Life Insurance company, that the big corporation, with almost half a billion of assets, has passed into the hands of a general committee which has clinched the hold of the Standard Oil company and its allied corporations upon the property of the 600,000 policy holders. At the last meeting of the board of trustees new by-laws were adopted for five standing committees, of each of which President Peabody and Vice President McClintock should be members ex-officio. There was a further provision that the supreme authority in the company should be vested in a general committee, to be composed of the president and the vice president and a representative of the five standing committees.

Rogers' Famous Slate. On the face of things, each committee was to meet and elect its own member of the general committee, but if rumors be true the slate was made up in the Standard Oil offices under the eye of H. H. Rogers. After the slate had been completed the several committees met, it is said, and simply ratified the slate, the result being as follows: George F. Baker, from the finance committee. Dumont Clarke, from the insurance and agency committee. John W. Anchinloss, from the auditing committee. Charles R. Henderson, from the real estate committee. Charles D. Dickey, from the mortuary claims committee.

Between meetings of the board of trustees these men will exercise all the powers of the board itself, acting in conjunction with President Peabody and Vice President McClintock. Dummies in Bourgeoisie? The evil which brought James H. Hyde's ownership of the Equitable Life Assurance company into disrepute—that of loading up the company with dummy directors—has been charged against Thomas F. Ryan's ownership of the Equitable at a meeting of stockholders. Equitable at a meeting of the minority stockholders and a lawyer of high standing, made the charge in a formal protest against the mutualization plan devised by Grover Cleveland and Paul Morton and sanctioned by Mr. Ryan. The meeting was called for the purpose of giving the stockholders an opportunity to vote on the plan. A two-thirds majority on the total capital stock of 1,000 shares was voted in favor of the plan. Under the new law, directors as well as stockholders of the Equitable are to vote in favor of mutualization to make it effective. The directors have informally authorized the change, and on Wednesday will meet to give it their formal approval. No Dummies, Morton Says. If Mr. Lord's charge that a number of the directors are dummies is sustained, it is contended by Morton that the mutualization plan will be nullified, as some of the directors who authorized it are legally not directors at all. Lawyers for the Equitable Life declare that under the new law there is no necessary for a director to be a stockholder, but merely a policy holder, and that even if Mr. Lord's charges were true, the mutualization of the society would not be illegal. Paul Morton, president of the Equitable, when asked if it was true that some of the stockholding directors were dummies, replied that it is not necessary for a director to be a stockholder, but a dummy director in the Equitable Life. Mr. Lord also protested against Grover Cleveland voting the Ryan stock, on the ground that the Ryan stock was not owned by Francis T. Lord and Francis Lord Seymour, executors of the Daniel Lord estate, joined in the protest.

LONGWORTHS SEE THE ASCOT RACES President's Daughter and Husband Among Favored Few in King's Enclosure. London, June 19.—Altho robbed of its picturesque state procession on account of the absence of Queen Alexandra, who is still in mourning, the prince of Wales, who is in Norway, and the duke of Connaught, who also is in mourning, Royal Ascot, England's great social race meeting, presented its usual brilliant scene at the opening of the meeting today. The royal enclosure, where King Edward and his guests assembled, was, with its gathering of well-dressed men and women, a carnival of color, the stands being crowded with the elite of the social world. The king, who is staying at Windsor for a week, drove with his guests in carriages thru the great park at Ascot. There was a great gathering of Americans and Anglo-Americans at the meeting. The Americans who were invited to the royal enclosure were Ambassador Reid, Mrs. Reid and Miss Reid, Secretary John Ridgely Carter of the American embassy, Mrs. Carter and Miss Carter, Major John H. Beacom, the American military attaché; Second Secretary Craig W. Wadsworth, Third Secretary Gran Smith, Dansey Jay, Ambassador Reid's private secretary, Congressman Nicholas Longworth and Mrs. Longworth, Ogden Mills, the Misses Mills, J. White and Miss Murrie White, the son and daughter of the American ambassador at Rome; Mrs. Charles H. Marshall, Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, Miss Gladys Vanderbilt, Dorothy White, Mrs. and Mrs. Anthony J. Drexel and Mr. and Mrs. John R. Drexel. Mr. and Mrs. Reid, Mr. and Mrs. Carter and Mr. and Mrs. Longworth rode from the portchester house in London, to Ascot in the ambassador's two automobiles.
