Beautiful appointments marked the marriage of Miss Katherine Modisette, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Modisette, and Edwin Dodge, which took place today at 4 p.m. in St. Mark's pro-cathedral. Several hundred guests were present, the twin city friends of Miss Modisette and Mr. Dodge. The bride has made Minneapolis her home for some time and is connected here in business.

Gordon Graham presided at the organ and played the nuptial program—"Benedictus" by Godard, "Serenade" by Schubert; "Traumerer" by Schumann, and "Violets," by Ellen Wright, while the ushers escorted the guests to their seats. The ushers included three of the classmates of Mr. Dodge at Lehigh university—George W. Case, Charles M. Case, Victor Johnson and Alfred F. Pillsbury, Daniel Raymond, Sumner Porter, Charles Pillsbury and Eder H. Moulton, Jr.

The interior of St. Mark's was beautiful with its decorations of fragrant peonies, palms, clustering ferns and trailing vines. The favorite colors of the bride, green and white, were chosen, and the soft glow of cathedral candles enhanced the exquisite appointments. Leading to the altar tall palms and myrtle trees made an aisle of green. Banked about the organ loft were palms and myrtle trees, and shining thru their foliage was the light of innumerable candles. Two tall candelabra held the lamps at the foot of the altar. Behind the thick, glossy foliage of palms and ferns made an exquisite setting.
