TWO BROKE BONES ON M. D.'S EXCURSION

WOMEN FELL INTO STOKERHOLE OF STEAMER ST. PAUL.

Abundant Medical Attendance was at Hand and the Injured Ones Promptly Had the Most Scientific and Efficient "First Aid"—Aged Guest Suffered Broken Arm.

Two women stepped over the unguarded edge of the freight of the Rapid Transit company's Minnetonka steamer St. Paul, and were seriously injured last night. The accident occurred just as the 300 or more members of the Minnesota State Medical association were landing at Tonka Bay after a trip up the lake from Excelsior.

Mrs. Charles Hill of Pine Island, Minn., suffered a fracture of her left arm, which was rendered more serious by her advanced age, 70 years. Mrs. W. S. Fleming, 201 Harvard street S.E., broke her left collarbone in the fall. Both victims were hurried to the Tonka Bay hotel, where medical attendance was abundant.

Owing to the cold, wet weather, the excursionists crowded the lower deck of the steamer and pressed close to the boiler and engine or warmth. Passengers run either side of the cockpit, a triangular opening in the deck which gives the firemen access to the firebox.

When the rush of people eager to escape from the chill air of the boat to the comfort of the hotel began, Mrs. Hill and Mrs. Fleming were at the stern of the boat and followed the crowd to the gangplank. They appeared only to notice the cockpit, the furnace door was open, and stepped over the edge. The greater part of the crowd was off the boat, and so quietly were the victims cared for that the accident was not generally known until the morning.

FALSE RUMOR REVEALS REAL INJURY OF CHILD

Publication of the Linden Hills rumor that a child had been killed by a streetcar has brought out the information that a child was severely injured last Sunday by a car. However, the rumor that a child had been killed by a Minnetonka car has been current in Linden Hills ever since at least two months, and had no connection in any way with the accident of last Sunday, as many Linden Hills people will testify.

Donald Keene, 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Keene, 4237 Washburn avenue, was gathering flowers near the street railway tracks late last Sunday afternoon. At the place the child was playing in a merry mood.

When the child was picked up it was found that some projection on the motorman's deck, had made a gash in the scalp two and a half inches long and penetrating to the bone. He was carried home by his father, who had several stitches in the wound.

LONG JOHN'S PARK



OFFICIAL BADGE IS THING OF BEAUTY

GRAND ARMY MEMBERS TO GET FINE SOUVENIRS.

Sample Design Is Received by Local Committee and Is Admired for Its Chaste Beauty and Artistic Merit—North High School Pupil Supplies Original Idea.

Delegates to the Grand Army encampment in Minneapolis in August will have reason to feel proud that they are delegates and therefore entitled to the official delegate badge which the local committee will furnish.

The badge is a handsome and artistic ornament, made of the finest bronze and finished with the greatest care. The official sample badge arrived from the manufacturers today and was the subject of many complimentary remarks at the meeting of the badge committee at the Commercial club today noon.

The face of the pendant bears a handsome reproduction in relief of the courthouse and city hall building. The obverse shows an equally beautiful relief of Minnehaha falls. On the front is the word, "Member," which is used by the G. A. R. in place of the usual "delegate."

The original design from which the badge is made was drawn by Harry Damer, a North Side high school art student. It has been slightly modified in the design finally adopted, the cantonment idea being worked out by the committee.

MISSIONARIES PREPARE FOR WORK AMONG ESKIMOS.

Reports from Schools and Hospitals Show That They Are Under Able Management—Appropriations Are Made to Further Work in Home and Foreign Lands.

The Swedish mission covenant will place Rev. O. P. Anderson, their Alaskan missionary, in charge of the two \$2,000 schoolhouses, which the covenant will erect at Golovin Bay and Yakutat, during their period of construction.
