LONE BANDIT ROBS ST. PAUL OWL CAR

BAD MAN WITH A GUN COLLECTS FARES FROM CONDUCTOR.

Boarding Car at Terminus, Highwayman Holds Up Conductor and Motorman and Gets Away with His Plunder—Conductor Saves \$30 in Bills by Sitting on It.

The conductor and motorman on a Mississippi streetcar were held up at a lonely spot in the wilds of St. Paul at 2:30 a.m. today, and robbed of their fares and their personal funds.

The Mississippi streetcar line's terminus is at the intersection of Edgerton streets, St. Paul. There the owl cars have a wait of twenty minutes. Taking advantage of this wait, the motorman went to sleep. The conductor sat down near the rear door and began to count his money. He thumbed over \$30 in bills and laid it on the seat.

Then he counted the \$6 or \$7 in coin, when suddenly he heard a footstep and looked up into a revolver. Ordered to deliver, he gave up the coin. But he squirmed over on the bills, and the highwayman missed out, \$30 worth.

Then the bandit went "up the aisle, up forward please," awakening the motorman, he annexed the sleepy man's small change. Then he obeyed the printed instructions posted in the car and started for the rear in ample time to alight before the car could pass his stopping place, or even start for it. Jerking the trolley from the wire and leaving the car in darkness, the bandit escaped.

TEST OF R. R. TAXATION

ROCK ISLAND FIGHTING ATTEMPTS TO TAX IT FOR A DRAINAGE DITCH.

Under the gross earnings system, the railroads are supposed to be exempt from any other form of taxation. They escape assessment for the taxes levied in the cities, and pay no taxes on railroad lands, whether used or not. However, it has been the practice to assess railroad companies for drainage ditches which benefit railroad lands or right of way, and the roads have generally paid such assessments, without conceding that the localities had a right to make the assessment.

The Rock Island road is the first to make a test of this point. It brought a test case in Nobles county, where it had been assessed to help buy in a drainage ditch which benefited a part of the road's right of way. The district court refused to grant the writ, and the court has decided in its favor, holding that the company cannot be taxed in any other way than that of the 4 per cent gross earnings tax. The case will be appealed to the supreme court, and a final decision had, if it should go against the railroad, then the cities will proceed to assess taxes against the railroads for drainage ditches, and other special improvements.

MACARONI TRUST IS EXTENDING TENTACLES

Capitalized at \$2,500,000 and controlling the principal macaroni manufacturing plants in the country, Flour company of New York, known as the macaroni trust, will soon be organized under the laws of New Jersey, and trust macaroni and spaghetti and spaghetti and trust noodles will be placed on the Minneapolis market. Included in the company's holdings will be the Minnesota Macaroni company of St. Paul.

Manufacturers of macaroni and its kindred wheat products have already formed an association which controls the market price of macaroni, but independent companies have slowly grown, and there has been no attempt to pool profits. The new company will take eight of the largest manufacturing plants in the country, and aggregate capacity of the plants will be 27,000,000 pounds a year.

INJURY PROVES FATAL

Roy O'Dea Dies as Result of Assault by Unknown Robber.

Roy O'Dea, taken to the St. Paul city hospital a week ago from a boxcar, died yesterday. He was slowly growing worse from the time he was received at the institution. He claimed to have been beaten and robbed of \$14 by a man while heading his way from his home at Monroe, Wis. He was 22 years of age and by trade a plumber's assistant. The detectives are furnished with a description of O'Dea's assailant.

SINGS FOR CITY MISSION

Vocalist Engaged and More Wanted by Superintendent Stocking.

Stocking wishes to engage more singers to sing in a chorus for the G. A. R. encampment week, as he expects to hold two services a day from the Mission's large gospel wagon. All singers will be paid for their services.

FWOHLER PLANS APPROVED

Contractors Are Now Preparing Estimates for New Methodist Church.

Plans for the new Fowler Methodist Episcopal church have been completed by the architect, and yesterday were approved by the building committee at a meeting held in the office of Peter Mitchell in the Lumber Exchange. Copies of the specifications are now in the hands of a half dozen contractors, and it is expected that the estimates will be submitted some time next week. Ground will probably be broken early in July.

DR. A. B. COLE MAY G. A. R. WILL HOLD MANY REUNIONS

ABSENCE OF TROOPS CHANGES ENCAMPMENT PLANS.

Tuesday Afternoon of Gala Week Will Be Left Open for Meetings of Auxiliary Associations, Regiments, Brigades and Corps—Chance for Veterans to Meet Army Friends.

According to plans of the committees in charge of the Great Army encampment, Tuesday afternoon, June 14, will be officially designated "reunion afternoon," and at this time every effort will be made to make possible the renewal of war-time friendships and the meeting of former comrades. Minneapolis veterans are unanimously in favor of devoting one afternoon of the encampment week to regimental, brigade and state association reunions, and also at former encampments attempt to name an official reunion day was attempted, it is probable that the feature will be introduced in connection with the Minneapolis gathering.

Military Parade Abandoned.

It was at first intended to have a military parade on Tuesday afternoon in which Civil War veterans, the state militia, and other organizations would participate. War department plans interfered, however, and the Fort Snelling troops were ordered to leave the fort July 15 for Indian reservations, where they are scheduled to participate in general military maneuvers. An appeal was made to the war department asking that the order be countermanded and the regulars allowed to participate in the exercises in connection with the Minneapolis encampment, but the appeal proved ineffectual, and on July 15 the Snelling soldiers will leave Minneapolis for several months absence.

As a result of the inability of the committee to secure the presence of the regulars it is probable that the military parade will be abandoned and Tuesday afternoon devoted solely to reunions and meetings of the veterans with the city hall as the general reunion headquarters.

Headquarters Designated.

During the encampment, headquarters for the Minnesota veterans will be established on the ground floor of the city hall. The quarters will be maintained separately from the Minnesota department headquarters, and will be used as a general rendezvous for all soldiers who served in Minnesota regiments. A register and information bureau will be provided for the convenience of the veterans.

Arrangements are being made as rapidly as possible for the headquarters for the many regimental and battalion organizations which have applied for places of meeting. Today a room on the ground floor of the city hall was assigned to the Fifth New York cavalry and an attempt will be made to provide for every organization of this character which applies for headquarters.
