





In the forty races that have been rowed, since the initial contest in 1852, five points now separate the contesting universities, Yale having won twenty-two races and Harvard seventeen.

BADGERS AT GOLF ON JANESVILLE LINKS

Janesville, Wis., June 27.—Excellent golf marked the first day of the Wisconsin state golf championship. Thirty-two of the fifty entries were the eighteen holes of the qualifying round were run, and an 81 by F. W. Jacobs of Madison, who was runner-up to W. A.
