ELLIOTT DENIES RUMOR

PRESIDENT OF NORTHERN PACIFIC SAYS HE HAS NO INTENTION OF QUITTING HIS JOB.

The Wall street rumor that Howard Elliott had resigned the presidency of the Northern Pacific road, the resignation to take effect on July 1, has been denied by no less an authority than Mr. Elliott himself. He was seen at the Auditorium Annex hotel, Chicago, today, and had this to say: "I have not resigned the presidency of the Northern Pacific railway. I have no intention of doing so, and I am well satisfied with the general operations of the road. I read something about my resignation in an eastern paper while in New York. There isn't a bit of truth in it."
The rumor was given little credence here, as no intimation of such a move had been given, and Mr. Elliott's management of the great property is known to be satisfactory. The rumor was discredited particularly because the time of his retirement was given as July 1, only two days after the notice of it. Many big changes in railway management are done under cover, but there are few instances where the cover does not leak a little.

800 STATIONS LOCATED

Towns on New Branch Roads Are Ready for Inhabitants.

C. A. Campbell, townsite agent of the Soo line, has returned from a ten-day trip along the new lines that are being constructed by that company in Ward, William and McLean counties, North Dakota, and reports a condition of remarkable prosperity in that section of the state. Almost every acre of available government land has been filed upon and is being rapidly broken and seeded. The advent of these new lines of railroad insured convenient market and added thousands of acres to the cultivated area this season. Whole townships heretofore unbroken are now having fields of as promising grain as has ever been seen in the state.

Mr. Campbell was engaged in locating the new stations along the Drake and Drake lines and has definitely placed all of them. The names, locations and dates of opening sales are as follows:

- Flaxton line, 18 miles westward, Columbus, located on W. 1/2, 32-163-03.
- Ward county, sale 2 p.m. July 10; 12 miles, Kermit, W. 1/2, 32-163-05, Williams county, 2 p.m., July 11; 10 miles, Crosby, E. 1/2, 27-165-07, Williams county, 2 p.m., July 12; 12 miles, Ambrose, end of the line, 2 p.m., July 13.
- Drake line, westward on main line, 17 miles, Dogden, SW 1/4, 4-150-78, McLean county, 2 p.m., July 16; 13 miles, Buro, in 151-80, McLean county, 2 p.m., July 17; 17 miles to junction with Garrison line, Max, in 10-151-83, 2 p.m., July 18; 19 miles, Ryder, NW 1/4, 10-151-80, Ward county, 2 p.m., July 19; 17 miles, Plaza, end of line, in SW 1/4, 35-153-88, near the northeast corner of Fort Berthold reservation, soon to be opened, Ward county, 2 p.m., July 20.

These sales will be conducted in the same manner as proved popular and successful at the new townsites along the Thief River-Kemmare line last season, where thousands of dollars collected as premiums were donated to the local improvement clubs for street and other public improvements. Popular prices are placed upon the lots and no reservations are made for the sake of insuring impartiality and satisfaction to all.

It is expected that the same gratifying results will be obtained in these towns as were obtained last season, where hundreds of business men found desirable locations along the new lines. The growth and prosperity of some of these new towns was remarkable. A number of them reached a population of more than 500 in less than one year, and in some of them the bankers assert they cashed more than a half million dollars in grain checks alone, practically all of which found its way to the counters of merchants engaged in various lines of business in the towns.

The new towns this year are especially favored with regard to extent and richness of territory, and with the big crop in sight, are expected to surpass all records in townsite development.

Iowa Central, July 21, from points between Centerville, Iowa, and Albert Lea, Minn., good for return morning of July 24, rate from Centerville, \$4.
St. Louis, July 23, from Fort Dodge and intermediate points, good for return July 30, rate from Fort Dodge, \$2.50.

TAKES CROWDS TO CIRCUITS

St. Louis Prepares to Handle 2,000 People on July 21.

For the fourth season the St. Louis road will run excursions into Watertown, S. D., for the annual circus, which this year is Ringling Brothers. The road is nearly swamped every season by the crowds that take the opportunity to travel cheap.

This year the company is prepared to handle forty carloads of 2,000 passengers, in the three trains which they will run from different points on July 21. One will leave Excelsior at 4:15 a.m.; another from Morton and a third from Dawson. The Excelsior train will leave Watertown at 6:30 a.m. and the round trip rate will be \$2.50.



TAKES ADVANCED POSITION

Winona Man Becomes Second Assistant Superintendent of Motive Power.

Winona, Minn., July 2.—E. B. Thompson, for the last three years master mechanic for the Chicago & North-Western road in this city, has left for Chicago, having been appointed assistant superintendent of motive power for the entire system. The work in this department has grown so that it has

become impossible for the superintendent and one assistant to attend to it properly, and Mr. Thompson has been named as a second assistant.

RAILROAD NOTES.

The Great Western has announced a special rate of \$14.75 for the round trip from St. Paul to Colfax Springs, Iowa. Proportionate low rates from points in the Chicago Great Western territory to the same place are in effect. The final return limit will be Oct. 31. It is expected that the other lines will meet the rate.

The Great Northern road has announced Fourth of July extension rates of one fare for the round trip between stations, except in Western Passenger association territory, where the round trip will be one fare and one-third. Western lines are considering a plan for checking baggage to destination without escort. Some eastern lines have signified that they are agreeable. It will come up at the Kansas City meeting, Sept. 18.
The Chicago & North-Western have put in summer round-trip tourist rates to Canada and New England points of one fare plus \$2, with fifteen-day limit from sale. The fare is one fare plus \$4 for a thirty-day limit. The rate does not

apply to New York. The action is to offset the special Colorado rates.
From points in Minnesota and North Dakota, east of Mandan, the Northern Pacific will put in a round-trip rate for one fare on account of the big fair in Winnipeg next month. Tickets will be on sale July 21 to 26, with a return limit of July 30. The fare is one of the big events of the year in western Canada, and is attended by large crowds. Many from the northern part of Minnesota and North Dakota go annually.
