DRIER WEATHER IS NEEDED FOR CROPS

CORRESPONDENTS GENERALLY COMPLAIN OF EXCESSIVE RAIN.

Red Rust Is Reported from Many Stations, but a Few Warm, Sunny Days, It is claimed, Would Send Wheat Booming Toward Bumper Yield—Some Sample Reports.

July came in with the crops in the northwest holding their own and the favorable indications of last week maintained. A number of Chamber of Commerce men ran out Saturday night and spent Sunday in the grain fields. The unfavorable developments of a minor nature noted last week were found. There is red rust in many fields, but it is too early for damage, and cool weather and winds operate to dissipate it rather than to make it spread. Farmers are complaining of too much rain, but agree generally that a little good weather will put everything right.

Some Sample Reports.
Country correspondents at points thru Minnesota, North and South Dakota sent in telegrams this morning to A. J. Cummings of the Chamber giving reports as follows:
Willmar, Minn.—Grain in good condition. Some red rust, but no damage. Dry weather very needed. Oats. Prospects good; headed out; will yield thirty-five to forty bushels.
Sioux Falls, S. D.—Wheat—Acreage small. Some talk of red rust; nothing serious. Corn—Backward. Oats—Almost an average yield expected.
Boyd, Minn.—In low lands drowned out. High land looks good, but some red rust. Watertown, S. D.—Crops could not be improved upon, and with favorable weather from now on will be fully up to last year.
Lamberton, Minn.—Wheat average crop of ten to twelve bushels per acre. Some red rust. Corn backward. Oats prospects good.
Mankato, Minn.—No rain over Sunday. Majority of wheat fields more or less infected by red rust, but so far no injury apparent as plant looks healthy and beginning to head out nicely.

Too Much Wet.
Morris, Minn.—Small grain not doing well; too much wet and cloudy weather; fields very wet.
Grafton, N. D.—Good prospects of a bumper crop as there was in 1895. Wheat heading out and all other grains doing well. Walsh, Pembina and Cavalier counties are in the same condition.
Waverly, Minn.—Wheat heading in two to three weeks late. About 15 to 20 per cent loss in acreage. Oats and corn slow.
Hoople, N. D.—Outlook good. Some red rust in wheat, which is further evidenced by wheat heading in but few places. Flax well advanced; outlook promises good crop.
Fargo, N. D.—Too much rain. Many reports of red rust prevailed. Wheat acreage small on account of excessive moisture.

Winona, Minn.—Wheat and oats coming along well. Corn backward; some fields not at all good; small and weak.
La Crosse, Wis.—Wheat, oats and barley doing nicely. Corn backward.
Red Wing, Minn.—Heavy red rust thru the barley fields, otherwise crops look favorable.
Valley City, N. D.—Stand fair, but fields looking bad; leaves near bottom of plant dead. Lots of red rust.
Breckinridge, Minn.—All grains in this vicinity looking fine; very heavy stand. Early-sown wheat heading out. Farmers say wheat never looked better.

Fairmount, Minn.—Wheat—Not a large acreage in this section. Corn—On high land fair, but ten days late; on low lands very poor; too much moisture.
Winnebago, Minn.—Reports of red rust in wheat, otherwise prospects fair, but must have dry weather. Corn—Doing well; has improved during last week.
Oats—Looking well; heading out.
