HOWARD ELLIOTT BACK; HAS NOT RESIGNED

Upon his return to St. Paul from an eastern trip, Howard Elliott made formal denial of the report that he had resigned as president of the Northern Pacific railroad. He said he had just returned from a week's trip to Boston, Cambridge and New York. At Cambridge he attended the celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of his class at Harvard—the class of 1881—and then went to New York to attend a meeting of the board of directors of the Northern Pacific Railway company, which was held last Friday. The first notice he saw about his alleged resignation as president of the Northern Pacific was in the Boston Herald of Saturday morning, which was in the form of a telegram from St. Paul. Neither the directors nor he knew anything about the report in New York on Friday, and he said there was absolutely no foundation for the rumor or story.

The Northern Pacific is now doing the largest business in its history, is in better condition than ever before and is spending very large sums of money to prepare for the increasing business of the northwest. At the board meeting, the only matters discussed were some routine questions and the general subject of adding to the property of the company so as to keep pace with the growth of the country.

LA CROSSE IS HOST TO SINGING CLUBS

BIENNIAL SANGERFEST WILL BE HELD THIS WEEK.

Chorus of 500 Trained Voices Will Render Songs of Norway and Sweden—Twin City Societies Will Travel on Special Burlington Train to Scene of Fest.

The eighth biennial sangerfest of the North-western Scandinavian Singers' union will be held this week at La Crosse, the dates being July 6, 7, 8. This festival will bring together about five hundred singers for the big chorus, which is the chief feature of these gatherings. The individual societies have been drilling on the various choruses for two years and have attained a fine degree of excellence.

Old-Time Favorites.

Among the numbers selected for the big chorus are the old favorites like "Ola! Trygvasson," by Reisinger; "Sigurd Jorsalfar," "Landjending" and "The Great White Host," by Grieg, and Bjornborgaranes March. The new numbers will be "Varde," by Haarklou; "Jotunheimen," by Sinding; and "Norge Norge," by Selmer, which were popularized in America by the Norwegian students.

All the railroads of the west have made special rates of a fare and a third for the round trip, or a fare plus \$2 where a fare and a third would be less than that. The citizens of La Crosse have made great preparations for entertaining the singers and have provided a series of receptions, banquets and picnics which will keep the visitors busy every minute of the time.

Twin City Singers.

Five societies will attend from the twin cities, namely, Dovre, Nordmaendenes and Apollo singing societies of Minneapolis, and Fram and Nordmaendenes of St. Paul. These have made arrangements for the first reception at the Burlington road. This will leave Minneapolis about 7 o'clock Friday morning, and assurance is given that it will reach La Crosse before 11, which is the time set for the first reception. The special will also carry Bjorne society of Grand Forks, Normanna of Duluth, Minnabha of Sioux Falls, Bjorvinn of Benson, and societies from Fargo, Pergus Falls, Canton, S. D., and other cities. The fare from Minneapolis has been placed at \$5.65 and it is the desire of the singers that as many of their friends as can spare the day or two accompany them. The special will leave La Crosse Sunday evening, reaching the twin cities about midnight.

It enclosed two bits of pasteboard, annual passes over the Minneapolis & St. Louis and the Iowa Central, with a note signed by the recipient, an Iowa congressman. He expressed his thanks for the favors, but said that, "under existing conditions," he did not consider it best to retain them.

"I am not dealing in passes," mused the puzzled secretary. "Send my own back a good while ago. Why does he send these to me?"

Then the solution began to dawn on him. The letter was meant for L. F. Day, general manager of the two railroads. The congressman had addressed it to the wrong town and had the initials mixed. The communication was promptly forwarded to the right address.

WOMEN CANVASS CITY.

Bright and early Monday morning about 250 women will begin the task of canvassing the city to learn how many rooms may be used for the Grand Army visitors. The accommodations committee of the Woman's Relief corps met yesterday afternoon in the W. R. The women who have been asked to assist the district chairmen are requested to be present at the federation of corps, which will be entertained Thursday afternoon by O. P. Morton corps in A. O. U. W. hall on Seventh street S. when instructions will be given them in regard to the canvassing. They will make their reports to the district chairmen, who will report to Mrs. Allen.
