PHONE COMPANIES UNITE
INDEPENDENT LINES IN NORTH DAKOTA CONSOLIDATE AND WILL BUILD EXTENSIONS.
Announcement has just been made of the consolidation of most of the important independent telephone companies in North Dakota and the organization of the North Dakota Independent Telephone company with its principal headquarters in Fargo. The stockholders of the new company are leading bankers and business men of the state, who believe in keeping their profits at home and who propose to give the rival interests some real competition.
The company begins business with about 1,000 miles of toll lines and is proceeding to build standard copper lines to connect all parts of the state, and in the near future expects to have connections with every city, town and village in North Dakota.
The company making up the North Dakota Independent Telephone company, up to this time, are as follows: The system from Anita to Casselton, with exchanges at Tople, Fidler, Page, Sharpe, Colgate and Ayr, with connecting lines to Clifford, Portland, Erie, Mason, Ripon, Mayville, Galesburg and Roswell, also the exchange at Casselton with lines to Fleming, Amedee, Howard and Saxony.
Exchanges at Valley City, Leal, Rogers, Hubbard, Ringold, Hastings, Newville, and connecting lines. Also the exchanges at Garrison, Jessenden, Bowles and Turtle Lake, with connecting lines to New Rockford and Amedee.
Exchanges at Bismarck, Dickinson and Glendive and a copper toll line from Bismarck to Glendive.
