**REPUBLICANS TO WIN, SAYS TAWNEY**

Good Times and the Good Work of Congress Will Carry the Party Thru.

Winona, Minn., July 6.—Congressman James A. Tawney, who leaves early in August for Chicago, in case the national republican committee decides to establish a western headquarters, and will be in entire charge of such headquarters. His work, however, will not be so confining as two years ago, when he was director of the speakers' bureau, and he expects to be able to come home at intervals. When asked his opinion as to the outlook for the congressional election in November, he said: "The prospects that the republicans will carry the congressional election are very favorable. No congress in the history of the republic has responded more promptly or more efficiently to the legislative needs of the people, as reflected through public opinion, than the first session of the forty-ninth congress. The number of public acts passed are double the number passed in any session of any previous congress since the adoption of the constitution, and the number of private bills passed in any previous session almost 100 per cent."

"The work of the session has left the opposition practically no issue upon which to go to the people, inasmuch as the legislation introduced and passed by the people was enacted in spite of powerful opposition. Our country and people are today more prosperous than at any time in the past and it is but reasonable to suppose that the voters will favor continuance of republican control in the next, or sixtieth, congress."

**TWOMBLY DROWNS TRYING LONG SWIM**

Only Son of Millionaire Meets Tragic Death—Nine Others Drowned.

Ashland, N. H., July 6.—H. McK. Twombly, Jr., 12 years old, was the only son of H. McK. Twombly, the New York capitalist, who was drowned in Big Squam lake, Holderness, N. H., yesterday.

Twombly started to swim from the Groton school camp to Carns Cove, one mile distant. When a short distance from his goal he was seen to struggle in the water, but before anyone in the camp could reach him he sank. The body was recovered. It will be taken to Newport.

Twombly's mother was Miss Florence A. Vanderbilt, a young farmer, shot and instantly killed 18-year-old Lucy Fisher and then ended his own life.

**JEALOUS IOWA SWAIN KILLS GIRL AND SELF**

Manning, Iowa, July 6.—At the close of a dance early yesterday morning Ernest Koehnke, a young farmer, shot and instantly killed 18-year-old Lucy Fisher and then ended his own life.

Miss Fisher was the daughter of a wealthy farmer, and discouraged Koehnke's attentions. He became insanely jealous and concealed himself in the grass near her home and shot her just as she parted from the neighbors who had accompanied her from the dance.

**FOUR DIE IN ST. JOHNS**

Jacksonville, Fla., July 6.—Four men were drowned in St. Johns river last night in attempting to cross the river in a small rowing boat. The crew consisted of six employees of the Armour Fertilizer factory in the boat, overloading it.

The boys who were drowned were out for a rowing cruise in the "dingy." With the exception of one of them all were inexperienced and the cause of the accident was the boat was overturned and all were thrown into the water. The men drowned were: Seaman O'Connell, Schron, Schapan, Pines and Eleng.

At the time of the accident there were seven men in the boat, but two of them were rescued by the life-saving crew.

**TWINE ALL SOLD**

State's Prison Plant Will Run Overtime to Meet Demands.

Stillwater, Minn., July 6.—Practically the entire output for 1906 of the prison twine factory has been disposed of—3,400,000 pounds in all. Small orders are being received every day, calls for 20,000 pounds coming this forenoon. It has been decided to work the plant overtime so that all orders can be filled promptly. The plant will be started a half hour earlier in the morning and will gain a half hour in the middle of the day and run two hours later at night.
