**PRIEST IS PROBING
PACKINGTOWN NOW**

Austrian Member of Sacred Heart
Order on Mission Important
to Packers.

Chicago, July 6.—A new stockyards
investigation, which probably will have
an effect, favorably or otherwise, on
the sales of Chicago meat products all
over Europe and a part of Asia, has
been started by the Rev. Francis
Smerstein of Austria, a representative
of 103 European hospitals using the
stockyards products.

Father Smerstein, who is a priest of
the Catholic Order of the Sacred Heart
of Jesus, has been ordered by his su-
perior general at Rome to make a
sweeping inspection of "Packingtown"
and send back his report immediately.
Owing to newspaper reports of the
of the stockyards, many physicians of
Europe are alarmed at the situation,
and their influence has been exerted
to send priests in charge of the Sacred
Heart hospitals to investigate the pack-
ing houses before accepting or reject-
ing officially any more of the Chicago
products.

To Publish Report in Europe.

The priest's report will be published
in Italy, Russia, Germany and England,
where the hospitals are located, and
meats exclusively. In Austria the in-
terests in the investigation is not so
great, because many home products are
used in the Sacred Heart hospitals.

Father Smerstein arrived in Chicago
on Tuesday and immediately made
plans for his tour of the yards. He
will be accompanied by Dr. A. Szaj-
wart, surgeon to the local Austrian con-
sul; M. L. Kasnar, a local Austrian at-
torney; and S. Zahajkiewicz. The lo-
cal committee consented to act with
Smerstein because he does not
speak English.

The priest was chosen for the task on
account of his reputation in Austria as
a skilled chemist, physician and apoth-
ecary.

EXPERTS SCORE CONDITIONS
Commercial Probers of Packingtown
and Scientists Disagree.

Chicago, July 6.—The report of the
committee of experts appointed by the
Illinois Manufacturers association and
the Commercial association to go down
into the stockyards and "reassure the
people" was made public today.

The experts, it appears, saw things
differently after the yards than the
lay members of the committee. The
committee wanted them to make im-
portant alterations in their report, it is
understood. This the experts were not
willing to do.

The committee, lay members and ex-
perts were in the office of the Illinois
Manufacturing association. At times
the session was extremely warm.

Sought to Use Whitewash.

Despite all denials to the contrary,
some of the members of the manufac-
turers association and some of the mem-
bers of the Commercial association
wished to eliminate severe statements
of the experts. Others fought vigor-
ously for the publication of an unex-
purgated report of the report found in
disfavor related to the quality of meat
and to the prevalence of tubercular
germs and lumpy jaws in cattle. This
was the question around which the dis-
cussion between the laymen and the ex-
perts centered.

The experts stood firm. They would
not alter their report in any important
essentials. They cut it
down from 61 to 51 pages, but the lay-
men contended and the experts support
them in the assertion, that this was
merely for the purpose of condensing.

**N. Y. LIFE MEN GRINCE
BEFORE PUBLIC OPINION**

New York, July 6.—Badly frightened
by the determined effort of the inter-
national policyholders' committee to
oust the present management of the
New York Life Insurance company at
the forthcoming election, those in con-
trol of the immense institution and its
\$450,000,000, have made the first ma-
terial concession to public opinion since
the exposure of insurance evils began.

A special meeting of the trustees was
held for the purpose of nominating the
"administration ticket." A special
committee, consisting of President Or-
and Trustees John Glavin and Henry
C. Mortimer, was appointed several days
ago to submit nominations.

It was agreed that all of the officers,
with the exception of President Or-
, shall not stand for re-election as trust-
ees. This stand was taken on the
ground that the prime duties of the
trustees is to pass upon the acts of the
officers and that when a man is both
a trustee and officer he passes judgment
upon his own acts.

**MAN, THOUGHT SLAIN,
FOUND IN AN ASYLUM**

New York, July 6.—When Moses J.
Van Name, a wealthy retired merchant
of Port Richmond, Staten Island, sud-
denly dropped from sight and the
knowledge of his relatives more than
six years ago, there were rumors of
certain causes which might have led
to his disappearance. For months a
vigorous search for the old man was
maintained. Mrs. Sloan, his daughter,
never relinquished her conviction that
he was alive. She clung steadfastly to
this idea, but the constant worry about
her father undermined her health, and
two years ago she died. Yesterday
it was reported that the old man
had been located in a private sanato-
rium at Amityville, L. I. Steps will be
taken at once for his release. Sensa-
tional disclosures are expected.

**SHOT TO DEATH THRU
FALLING SMOKESTACK**

Cincinnati, July 6.—Joseph Ayers
and F. Underwood, sheet iron workers,
fell 100 feet with and inside of a great
iron smokestack at the Front street
pumping station today, and were prob-
ably fatally injured. Both men sus-
tained fractured skulls and were other-
wise horribly mangled.

The accident was terribly dramatic.
The men were on the inside of a four-
foot stack and slipped down as the
stack fell over, being shot out on the
immense fire as it struck the ground
and striking the ground with force as
to rebound high in the air.
