

STALWARTS AGREE TO NAME SARLES

La Moure Dropped His Fight on North Dakota Governor in Conference Yesterday.

ORGANIZATION LEADERS CAUCUSED IN ST. PAUL

Fish and Bangs Rejected for Supreme Judge—A Republican to Be Nominated.

Peace reigns over the ranks of the North Dakota stalwarts, and as far as the state organization is concerned, the convention at Jamestown next Thursday will be nothing but a ratification. Governor Sarles will be renominated, and the rest of the slate will be made up without serious trouble, before the convention meets.

These Sure of Nomination. In addition to Governor Sarles, the following will also be named without any question: Congressman Marshall and Gronna, State Treasurer Peterson, State Superintendent W. L. Stockwell, Chief Justice Morgan, and two of the railroad commissioners, Chris Wiesner, La Moure county, and Erik Stafne of Richland. The third, C. Christianson of McHenry county, failed to bring in his delegation, and some one else will probably be named in his place.

Supreme Court Succession. There has been quite a tilt in the organization over a successor to Judge Young of Fargo, who has resigned as an associate justice. A movement was on foot to name Judge Frisk of Grand Forks, and yesterday some advocated the nomination of Tracy Bangs, a leading Grand Forks attorney.

Other Places Still Open. Alfred Blaisdell of Minot is a candidate for lieutenant governor, and the big Ward county delegation is conceded something, but may be switched to secretary of state. That place is open because of the retirement of Secretary Porter.

Will Let Insurgents Talk. The organization is in shape to force things thru at Jamestown, but the leaders in St. Paul agree that the insurgents should be handled with consideration, so as to leave no excuse for a bolt. The convention will probably be thrown open to the insurgents, and the insurgents will be given all the time they want to state their grievances, and full opportunity to contest and show their strength at every stage of the proceedings.

LIFE SENTENCES FOR FATHER, MOTHER, SON. Evansville, Ind., July 9.—Jonah Williams, his wife Minerva, and their son Wesley, were sentenced to prison for life today for the murder of James Leigh at Booneville last spring. Andrew Williams, another son is serving a sentence for a petty crime and two smaller children are in the reform school.

WARRANT IS ISSUED FOR QUAKER ICE MAN. Philadelphia, July 9.—District Attorney Bell today caused the issuance of a warrant for the arrest of Henry Behrenberg of the Mountain Ice company on a charge of conspiracy. Mr. Behrenberg is located in Jersey City, but if necessary to insure his appearance here for a hearing the district attorney says he will make requisition on the governor of New Jersey.

WILD ENGINE AMUCK; NINE MEN INJURED. Memphis, July 9.—A wild engine ran into two freight cars at the union depot today causing serious injury to nine men. The engine dashed into the depot yards without a crew.

WANT TO INDORSE SECRETARY OF WAR

North Carolina Republicans May Launch Taft Boom in Convention.

According to rumor the occasion is designed to mark the formal launching of the Taft presidential boom. TRIAL OF DREYFUS RESULTS IN DUEL

Challenger Fires Without Effect—His Opponent Refuses to Fire.

Paris, July 9.—The supreme court held a long secret session today and adjourned without announcing its decision in the Dreyfus case. It is expected that the decision of the Rennes court martial will be annulled, but the court is understood to be divided upon the question of quashing the verdict entirely or ordering a new trial.

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647 REBELS KILLED. Durban, Natal, July 9.—Natal troops have completely surrounded and defeated a rebel body in the Umvoti district. Five hundred and forty-seven rebels were killed. There were no casualties among the whites.

BOLD BOYS PLAY REAL HIGHWAYMEN

Three Young Bandits Hold Up Fruit Dealer and Steal His Cash.

A. Shapiro Loses Watch and 15 Cents to Youthful Hold-up Who Escapes.

Two daring robberies were committed last night by young boys who exhibited the nerve of old desperadoes. The police are scouring the city today trying to round up the gang. Sparer Katlos, proprietor of a fruit store at Second avenue S and Seventh street, was awakened in the night to see three boys standing by his bed. One of them held a club in his hand and commanded Katlos to get up and get his cash.

Shortly after this robbery A. Shapiro, 507 Eleventh avenue S, was held up by a young boy in front of his home. He was just returning when the young bandit stepped up to him and, pointing a revolver at his face, demanded his money. Shapiro allowed the robber to search him and take his watch and 15 cents.

The police have good descriptions of all the boys.

ADAMS PAYS LIFE FOR WORK AS SOLON


Wisconsin Congressman Died from Disease Aggravated by Service at Washington.

Chicago, July 9.—Congressman Henry C. Adams of Wisconsin died today in the Auditorium hotel. He had been ill for several weeks, and for a week had been confined to his room in the hotel. The home of Mr. Adams was at Madison, and he was a member of the fifty-eighth congress and was re-elected a member of the fifty-ninth. He was for two terms a member of the Wisconsin legislature, state superintendent of public property from 1884 to 1890, and chairman and local commissioner of Wisconsin from 1894 to 1902.

CHINESE TROOPS IN KHAKI. Shanghai, July 9.—An unprecedented and interesting spectacle was witnessed yesterday when 4,000 Chinese soldiers, who have been drilled assiduously for the last few months, paraded thru the flag-decked streets of the settlement. The men were dressed in khaki and presented a smart appearance.

DEATH SENTENCE FOR MURDER. Lehigh, Pa., July 9.—Alvin Karpis, charged with the murder of Henry Martin here thirteen weeks ago, has been found guilty and sentenced to death.

CLOSES BIG STORE FOR DEFYING LAW

Chicago Building Commissioner Stations Police at Marshall Field Doors.

Chicago, July 9.—The retail drygoods store of Marshall Field & Co. was closed to the public today by Building Commissioner Barsten because the management of the store had not complied with certain regulations to which its attention had been called by the commissioner. For several days the management and the commissioner have been in correspondence regarding the placing of red lights in the store for the purpose of marking exits and stairs. This morning when the commissioner became aware that the work had not been done over Sunday, he stationed officers at all doors of the place and allowed no one but employees to enter.

Manager Simmons, as soon as he was aware that all customers were being turned back at the entrances, hastened to the building commissioner, by whom he was informed that he "ought to be in jail."

WAR IS BEGUN ON WAITER'S NAPKIN. German Professor Declares It Is Unhygienic and a Menace to Health.

RED FLAG RIOTS IN ST. PETERSBURG

Crowds in Czar's Capital Wave Terrorist Banners and Sing Revolutionary Songs.

ADVANCE OF POLICE IS MET WITH STONES

Landlords in Provinces Where Peasants Are Riotous Flock to Moscow.

St. Petersburg, July 9.—Political demonstrations, in which the crowds carried red flags and sang revolutionary songs occurred in many places in St. Petersburg yesterday afternoon and night, necessitating the interference of the police and military patrols. Streets were held up and their occupants were compelled to uncover and salute the red flag.

Landlords Take Flight. Landlords from provinces where agrarian disorders are occurring are flocking into Moscow and St. Petersburg appealing for troops to protect their property, without which, they declare it is impossible to live on their estates.

Interior Minister Atolykin has sent to Moscow a number of representatives of other countries the government's official report of the Baisyetok rioting for transmission to their respective governments. This unprecedented action on the part of the Russian government does not involve a recognition of the right of foreign countries to make representations regarding the Baisyetok rioting.

TO SEIZE OUBOROK LANDS. Duma Committee Favors Plan—Troops Would Result.

St. Petersburg, July 9.—The first paragraph of the proposed agrarian law, the augmentation of the lands of the peasants by the expropriation of all state and crown domains and church and monastery lands, has been accepted by the committee of the lower house with practical unanimity.

Famine Ahead. A correspondent of the Associated Press has just completed a tour of the provinces of Samara and Saratov. He reports that the drought is finally broken, but that the rains have come too late to save the crops. The peasants are in a pitiable condition.
