

TALLYHO FANFARE AIDS HIGHWAYMEN

Din of Confederates in Coach Drowns Out Cries of Beaten Victim.

Special to The Journal. Chicago, July 10.—In one of the most remarkable holdups in the annals of the Chicago police, a holdup in which the highwaymen went in search of their victim in a tallyho coach and with a large party of men and women friends to boot horns and cheer and sing songs to drown the cries for help.

Tucker was returning to his home when he was attracted by the coach and stopped to watch it pass by. The driver brought his team of four horses to a standstill and two men armed with revolvers descended from the vehicle and commanded Tucker to throw up his hands.

Beat Victim in Crowd's Presence.

After they had secured all of his valuables one of the highwaymen struck Tucker on the face, knocking him down, and then both kicked and struck him with their revolvers until he was almost unconscious.

All the available policemen in the three stations were at once put in motion and the search for the vehicle was made in all directions. They were stationed along Washington boulevard from Western avenue to Washenow avenue and along the cross streets to the westward.

Tucker was unable to give the police a description of the men who robbed him. He said that they were young and well dressed, but that the coach which was driven close to the curbstone, shut out the light so that he could not get a good look at their faces.

TEACHERS' PAY IS BELOW LABORERS'

Indiana Educator Predicts Spread of Private Schools Unless Salaries Are Raised.

New Haven, Conn., July 10.—The American Institute of Instruction opened its annual convention today with sessions in several departments. There was a general session in Woolsey hall, at which the steady increase of the cost of education in Indiana, as pointed out by Albert G. Keller of Yale, President P. W. Hamilton of Tufts college and Kate Stevens of the Teachers' Training college, were discussed.

Mr. Kendall predicted that unless higher salaries were paid to teachers there would be a steady increase of private schools, to which many thoughtful people would send their children. Mr. Kendall argued that the public school might well cost for its maintenance half as much as the tuition charge of private schools.

SEIZE POWER NOW, COMMITTEE URGES

Life Insurance Policyholders Spurred to Action by International Representatives.

New York, July 10.—The International Policyholders' committee, organized to overthrow the present management of the New York Life Insurance company and the Mutual Life Insurance company of New York, has organized a permanent organization at a meeting here, by the election of the following officers:

Chairman, Richard Olney of Massachusetts; Vice chairman, Governor J. Frank Manly of Indiana; Executive committee—Alton B. Parker of New York; Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota; Charles Emory Smith of Pennsylvania; Harlow N. Higginbotham of Illinois; A. M. Shook of Tennessee; Governor Henry Roberts of Connecticut; Governor Pennypacker of Pennsylvania.

The general committee formally added to the list of its members the names of J. C. Owens and Harwood Bannard, M.P., to represent the English policyholders. After the meeting the committee issued an address to policyholders explaining the inception of the committee and outlining its plan of action.

Reciting that the voting power has gradually been transferred from the policyholders to a few of the executive officers centered in New York, the address says that it is necessary for the 1,200,000 policyholders to organize without delay, and that the law recently enacted afford the policyholders their only opportunity to obtain complete control in one election, while hereafter only half the directors can be chosen in any one election.

The law requires that the policyholders of a mutual company shall elect from among themselves a few of the executive officers, scattered throughout the world, to vote. It gradually became a recognized custom among the officers to secure, thru agents, proxies made out to their own independent offices of the company upon the delivery of the policy. In this way the voting power was gradually transferred from the policyholders to a few of the executive officers.

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DREADING SCAFFOLD GIRL DENIES GUILT

Emma Stephany, Oringing in Cell, Retracts Confession that She Slew Sweetheart.

Journal Special Service. Pottsville, Pa., July 10.—Filled with dread of the scaffold, Emma Stephany has retracted the confession she made last week that she had killed her sweetheart, James Frizzell.

From the studied indifference which the girl maintained before the police she has now changed to one of terror. The girl sits all day in her cell, weeping bitterly. She eats little, sleeps less and pitifully exclaims: "They can't hang me, for I didn't do the shooting."

ASSASSIN STAYED BY BABE IN ARMS

Slayer of Marcum Let Victim Off Once, Declares Hargis' Prosecutor.

Beattyville, Ky., July 10.—At the convening of court, B. R. Joubert made the opening speech for the commonwealth in the case of the assassination of J. B. Marcum. He accused the assassin of the conspiracy Jim Hargis and Jim Callahan, B. F. French, J. C. Smith, John Abner and Tom White.

One incident which he promised to prove was a plot for Tom White to shoot Marcum with a shotgun as he passed Hargis' store. Marcum was held by his baby in his arms, White, he said, was upbraided for not shooting, and replied that he did not want to kill the baby. Hargis is quoted as saying: "You ought to send the brat to hell with its daddy."

He promised to prove by James Mann and Asbury Spicer that Hargis tried to get them to kill Marcum, agreeing to give Spicer \$500 to do the work. Hargis feared that Marcum would be acquitted of a libel charge and Jett and White were given their final orders for the actual assassination in the courthouse door, Hargis and Callahan looking on from the balcony. He was defended by J. J. C. Bach on behalf of the defense.

BROKER SLAYS SELF IN WALDORF-ASTORIA

New York, July 10.—Norman C. Leopold, a young broker, killed himself by shooting in a room in the Waldorf-Astoria hotel some time yesterday.

He registered at the hotel in the morning and subsequently directed a note to a friend bidding him good-bye. The note alarmed relatives, who began a search of the hotels of the city. A cousin learned that the young man had registered at the Waldorf and his apartments were broken into late last night. Leopold's body was found with a bullet hole in the head. He was a member of the New York Stock exchange.

He has sent to all national banks a letter requesting them to issue as much of the aggregate of their circulating notes in five-dollar bills as possible.
