BODY BLOW DEALT ARMOR PLATE TRUST

Independent Concern Underbids Carnegie and Bethlehem Companies by \$178,030.

Journal Special Service. Washington, July 11.—A body blow has been given the armor plate trust by the Midvale Steel company, an independent organization, which has submitted bids to the navy department for armor plate for the battleships South Carolina and Michigan. The bid of the Midvale company is so much lower than those submitted by the Carnegie and Bethlehem Steel companies that the government will be forced to award the contracts to the Midvale company. For the first time in many years the bids of the Carnegie and of the Bethlehem companies were different. They have usually been the same. The bids were as follows: Carnegie Steel company, 7,828 tons, aggregate bid, \$2,513,553, upon a basis of \$321 a ton for all the armor except a small amount used for bolts and nuts. Bethlehem Steel company, 7,828 tons, aggregate bid, \$2,335,520, based upon \$300 a ton for the bulk of the armor, except bolts and nuts. The bid of the Midvale company is thus \$178,030 less than the bid of the Carnegie company, its nearest competitor.

BOY JILTS A GIRL AND WEDS WOMAN OF 70

Journal Special Service. St. Joseph, Mich., July 11.—Frank Kreigh, aged 19, and Sara Elin, wife of Jane Lemon, aged 70, were married here yesterday. Kreigh is a farmer residing near Niles. He is just out of school. He was engaged to a girl of his school days when he met Mrs. Lemon at a church social and became infatuated with her. Kreigh admitted it and all the persuasion by his friends could not induce him to give up his suit. He jilted his maiden sweetheart and proposed to Sara Eliza Jane Lemon. He was accepted in the same motherly way and the wedding ceremony was immediately performed. "I am happy," declared young Kreigh after the marriage ceremony was performed. "I am happy because I am ideal in a wife and I propose that our life will be one continued honeymoon."

SANTO DOMINGO BATTLE FATAL TO A GENERAL

Journal Special Service. St. Thomas, July 11.—Reliable news has been received here of the death in battle of General Gamacho of Santo Domingo. The revolutionary chief, Maureles, is in a strong position in that locality, giving headway to the revolution. He refuses the government overtures. Rejection by the Dominican congress of the Italian-Dominican protocol, it is believed, will produce complications with the Italian government. The ground of rejection is that it would be unconstitutional for the provisional government to negotiate treaties or to sign a convention of an international character. On the same ground is declared null and void the protocol of the provisional government with American Minister Powell, contracting a loan of \$5,000,000.

BOY LEAVES PASTOR AND KILLS HIMSELF IN YARD

Journal Special Service. New York, July 11.—William Fink, 19 years old, of Newark, N. J., is dead, a suicide. He drank carbolic acid and was found writhing in agony in a vacant lot near the residence of Rev. Alfred Stuebline, pastor of Bethany Presbyterian church. When the clergyman was notified of the boy's condition he said that Fink had left the parsonage only a few moments before, after the minister had pleaded for more than two hours with him to lead a better life.

STRANDED IN MID-OCEAN WHILE HER HUSBAND DIES

Journal Special Service. St. Louis, July 11.—Stranded on a coral reef which was hidden beneath the bosom of the Pacific ocean near the island of Guam, thousands of miles from home, Mrs. P. A. Galvan of St. Louis eagerly awaited the rescue of the transport Thomas, in order that she might proceed on her journey to Manila to make her home with her husband there. While she was helpless in mid-ocean Mr. Galvan died from an attack of cholera. She does not yet know of his death.
