WOMAN SAVES HER LIFE BY SINGING

Mrs. Underwood, Attacked by Cougar in Hills, Charming Beast by Voice.

Special to The Journal. Deadwood, S. D., July 11.—Kept a captive thru an entire night by a ferocious mountain lion, and saved from a horrible death only by her singing, was the experience of Mrs. John Underwood, who, with her family, was camping on the banks of Iron creek near Harney peak. This is one of the wildest and most rugged regions of the Black Hills. Wild animals, long extinct in other parts, still make their homes among the rocks and caves, and hide in the dark recesses of this park-like wonderland.

Mr. and Mrs. Underwood and their three children came recently from New York. Mr. Underwood to look after some mining interests and the family to enjoy the novelty of camp life in the Hills. They camped in a commodious tent in a small park just back from the precipitous banks of Iron creek. One evening last week, just before sundown, Mrs. Underwood started from camp alone to meet her husband, who was coming from the mine. She missed her way and, she tried to keep her wits about her and look for familiar landmarks, yet it was not long until she realized that she was hopelessly lost.

Attacked by Mountain Lion. Just as the last flicker of daylight vanished she was startled by a frightful scream behind her and at the same moment was borne to the ground by an immense mountain lion. The fall did not hurt her, but as the wild-eyed animal stood over her and she realized her probable fate, she screamed in terror. The lion lifted his head at the sound of the echo which her voice awakened and when she saw that his attention was attracted, it came to her mind that she had read of wild animals being subdued by the sound of the human voice.

She then began to sing, first in a faltering and uncertain voice, but afterwards more steadily and clearly as she found that she could distract the beast. Thru the chill night of the mountains she sang, now gaily, now desperately, all the songs she had ever heard, while

the immense cat lay in apparent content with one huge paw stretched over her, holding her in a vise-like grip.

Rescued by Husband. She had wandered further from the beaten path than she had realized, and it was not until the day began to break that Mr. Underwood, guided by the sound of her voice, found his imprisoned wife. A carefully directed shot from his rifle brought a speedy death to the lion and Mrs. Underwood was rescued, thoroly unharmed from her night's experience but otherwise unharmed.

The lion measured eight feet from tip to tip and weighed not less than a hundred pounds. Mr. and Mrs. Underwood broke camp the following day and returned east.

This is the first lion seen in the southern Hills for years, and the supposition is that it was made desperate by starvation, as it is a very unusual thing for one of these cougars to attack a human being.

FRISCO MOB SEEKS MINNEAPOLIS FLOUR

Another Crowd of Women Storm Relief Station in Quest of Food.

Journal Special Service. San Francisco, July 11.—Women demanding Minneapolis flour caused another commotion at relief headquarters yesterday afternoon that almost reached the proportions of a riot. There were twenty-five or thirty women with little white slips calling for flour. These orders had been issued Saturday and the bearers were instructed to call at the various relief stations for the supply, but when they arrived there was no flour.

The women then marched in a body to the Hamilton school and laid their complaints before those in charge. Commissioner Devine not being present. The women were indignant. Assistant Secretary Cooper, who had to meet the charges of the flour brigade, said the orders had been given in good faith and that the flour had been ordered to the various relief stations, but why it had not been delivered he did not know. Probably some mistake in the delivery had caused all the trouble. They hoped to have the flour ready to meet the demands today.

RIVERS AND LAKES TAKE HEAVY TOLL

Eight More Drownings in the Northwest—One Makes an Old Man Insane.

Special to The Journal. Iowa City, Iowa, July 11.—The body of Mrs. Joseph Chabal, aged 70, wife of a pioneer section foreman on the Rock Island road, was found in the Iowa river today, she having, it is supposed, committed suicide. Chabal, after learning of his wife's fate, became insane.

Milwaukee, July 11.—Three men who stole the racing yacht Vandal, are believed to have perished while trying to cross the lake to their homes near Grand Rapids. The police of every city on Lake Michigan have watched for the crew in vain, and there is no doubt that the thieves perished.

La Crosse, Wis., July 11.—The body of a stranger, found in the Mississippi river a few miles below this city, has been identified as that of Calogero Santoni, an Italian, who was employed on the Milwaukee double track crew at Drexelbach. He went bathing in the river on the fourth of July and was drowned.

Clinton, Iowa, July 11.—Bruce Wallace, aged about 13 years, met death by drowning in the waters of Mill Creek, a small stream which flows west of Clinton, last night.

Superior, Wis., July 11.—John Hines, a laborer at the ore docks on Allouez bay, was drowned while attempting to rescue his hat. The drowning occurred in a night of about 100 degrees and his fellow laborers of the man, who were unable to go to his assistance, because they were on the top of the dock, seventy-five feet from the water.

Green Bay, Wis., July 11.—Ira, the 6-year-old son of John Stein, a railroad conductor, was drowned in three feet of water in the Fox river. The child had been playing on some logs.

Red Wing, Minn., July 11.—The body of Agnes Collins, who was drowned with her sister two weeks ago, was recovered today.

BARRILLAS' REBELS ROUTED WITH EASE

Guatemala Has Little Difficulty in Crushing Former President's Insurrection.

Washington, July 11.—The Guatemalan minister, Mr. Molina, is gratified by the favorable reports received from his government concerning the revolutionary movement there.

"My government suppressed the insurrection led by General Barrillas with great ease," Mr. Molina said. "That was to be expected. Barrillas' army is scarcely more than a band of illiterate Indians of poor fighting ability. He is not a suitable man for president, and is opposed to any development of the country. When he secured the presidency for a brief period years ago thru the death of General Reina Barrios, he was a tool of the clerical party, his administration was marked by atrocities and he involved Guatemala in entanglements with the United States, to which he is opposed."

"President Castell on the other hand, is in love with everything American. He has sent two of his sons to American colleges to learn American ideas and methods, which he is trying to introduce in the country."

TEETOTALERS ONLY ON FIRST M. O. LINE

Sobriety Demanded of Employees of America's Only Municipal Ownership Railway.

Monroe, La., July 11.—In choosing motormen for what is believed to be the first municipally owned and built street railway in the United States, the street railway of Monroe, Mayor A. A. Forsythe last night said that the first test for fitness for this position will be total abstinence from all intoxicating liquors.

It is expected that the railway will begin operating in a short time. A remarkable feature is the fact that the trustees of the corporation have not directed the taxpayers a cent, all expenses being defrayed by revenues from the city's municipal waterworks, electric-light plant, wharves and other municipally owned public utilities.

NELSON SIGNS FOR EXHIBITION BOUT

TURNERS TRU Delegates to Convention Investigating Coney Island Today.

Newark, N. J., July 11.—The North American Turners will conclude its biennial convention here today. The delegates will be taken on an excursion to Coney Island. The convention adopted today a resolution offered by Dr. Hartung of Chicago that the work and scope of the German national teachers' seminar in Milwaukee be secured by means of a guarantee fund to be organized by popular subscription. Some of the delegates were in favor of levying a head tax for the purpose, but the offer of contributions from Kansas City, Newark, Oklahoma and other cities cited swung the delegates to the popular contribution plan.

NEW YORKERS LEAD IN THE GOLF PLAY

New York, July 11.—New York led the field in the first day's play in the national amateur golf championship at the Englewood Golf club yesterday. Dwight Partridge, a Yale player entered from the Bedford club, had 70; Walter J. Travis, 77; C. H. Van Vleet, Jr., Montclair, 78, and Jerome D. Travers of the Nassau club and metropolitan champion, 80. Travers' round was played thru a terrific thunderstorm, which marred the scores of many.

Eben Byers of Pittsburg, the only player to have three on the first hole, went out in 38, a 75 gain, but the storm caught him on the last few holes and he had to be content with 80.

Chandler Egan of Chicago, the present champion, was the only prominent western player to start before the storm. Wild play on the iron shots, usually his best game, caused him two sevens and a six. Two threes and two twos aided him, however, and he was tied for sixth place at 81.

D. E. Sawyer and G. F. Clingman of Chicago and Harold Weber of Toledo were high on account of the downpour. D. P. Fredericks of Oil City, who won the low-score prize last year, did 84.
