 WESTERN DESERTS
 MADE TO BLOSSOM**

MILLIONS OF DESOLATE ACRES BECOME FRUITFUL FARMS.

Representative of Government Reclamation Service Outlines Wonders Wrought Thru Application of Water to Barren Wastes—Millions of Dollars Used in Construction of Irrigating Works.

Thirty million acres of land in the great American desert will be made inhabitable and fertile thru the irrigation and reclamation work now being carried on by the United States government. This is the statement of C. J. Blanchard, a Minneapolis man employed in the government reclamation service, who described the engineering projects of the west in a lecture at the Merriam Park Congregational church last evening.

Mr. Blanchard stated that the plan of reclamation authorized by congress calls for the erection of irrigating works at an expenditure of \$38,000,000, the expenses to be born by the owners of the land benefited. Thirty-two contracts for the building of dams have been let and three years will be required to complete the work outlined.

Builds Cement Mill.
 Many of the projects are located in almost inaccessible places. The Roosevelt dam site in Arizona is located sixty-two miles from a railroad and the government has been required to build its own cement mill, but when constructed the dam will maintain the largest artificial lake in the world.

On the Shoshone river in Wyoming the highest dam in the world is in process of construction, and on the lower Colorado river an immense dam is being constructed. In South Dakota near the Black Hills an earthen dam mile long will create the largest lake in the state.

Nevada Will Bloom.

In many places the work of reclamation has been completed, and 12,000 acres of the most desolate land in Nevada is now being furnished water by the government, and 200,000 acres will be reclaimed this year in that state. Railroads in the west are extending their lines to reach the reclaimed lands and settlers are gradually converting the irrigated territories into fertile farms. New towns are springing up and homes are being provided for thousands of families.

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WILL MAKE BUTTER TUBS

The Co-operative Barrel company, which now has an extensive plant for making four barrels at Seventh street S and Eleventh avenue, will soon enlarge its business by the addition of a factory for manufacturing butter tubs. A new building 20x36 feet and two stories high, will be erected, and machinery for the new work has been ordered.

Some of this machinery has to be manufactured to order so it will be a matter of about sixty days before the new factory is in operation.

The factory now gives employment to about seventy-five men, and forty more will be needed in making butter tubs. At present, four sizes of butter tubs will be manufactured, but in time it is the intention of the company to manufacture a full line of creamery and dairy packages.

KERR WILL SING TONIGHT

NOTED BARYTONE WILL APPEAR AT LAKE HARRIET TO GIVE POSTPONED PROGRAM.



U. S. KERR, Barytone Who Will Sing at Lake Harriet This Evening.

The thirty-third degree of dampness given the atmosphere on and about the Lake Harriet pavilion roof garden by the storm of yesterday afternoon made U. S. Kerr's appearance with the Oberhoffer Orchestra last night impossible. Unless heavy rains interfere he will appear this evening, in connection with the usual Friday night Wagnerian program and will sing the "Song to the Evening Star," announced for last night, from Wagner's "Tannhauser." This evening's program for the band will include selections from "Die Meistersinger," "Goetterdaemmerung," "Das Rheingold" and "Tannhauser." There will be two other special numbers in addition to Mr. Kerr's solo. Mr. Marlow, cornetist, will play Walther's "Dream Song" from "Meistersinger," and the band will give the Moorish Suite, with which Gilmore won much fame. With such a program of Wagnerian numbers and Mr. Kerr's vocal solo, tonight's offering is by far the biggest of the Oberhoffer engagement. In spite of the damp condition of nearly everything at the roof garden last night and of the preliminary announcement that it would be impossible for Mr. Kerr to sing, several hundred enthusiasts were thoroughly pleased with "Samson and Delilah" and the other numbers on the program, and as an "extra" Mr. Oberhoffer added the overture from "William Tell."

MURDERER DOOMED BY SUPREME COURT

Henry Crowlow of Goodhue, Goodhue county, will probably be hanged, as a result of the decision of the Minnesota supreme court, rendered today. Crowlow killed a bartender at Goodhue, and a jury in the circuit court of that county found him guilty of murder in the first degree. The case was appealed to the supreme court, the defendant setting up that the murder was not premeditated, as the trial jury found. The supreme court today confirms the finding of the jury and refuses a new trial.

SOUGHT BY IOWA SHERIFF.
 Governor John A. Johnson is holding a hearing late this afternoon on a request for recapture of Charles E. Schobinger, a resident in Paul county, Iowa, on a charge of stealing two horses and buggies. He is at present in custody in Minneapolis.

SCHWAR BREAKS A LEG THRU WATCHING STORM

The spectacular storm of yesterday afternoon was the indirect cause of Albert Schwar's breaking his leg. The sky was so black, the clouds rolled so thickly, the lightning was so sharp, and all nature seemed so awe-inspiring that Mr. Schwar leaned far out of a third-story window better to watch the storm effects. He lost his balance, and fell to the pavement, breaking his leg.

He is receiving treatment at the city hospital.

Thousands of other Minneapolis people surveyed the storm from less dangerous vantage points. A second edition of the deluge descended yesterday afternoon, and for a time Minneapolis was truly Venetian. The streets were flooded and water poured over the sidewalks in the down-town streets. Street cars were held up, traffic of all sorts was delayed and for a time business was suspended while everybody watched the rain. The rain was accompanied by a severe hail storm that added to the confusion, scaring horses and exciting those who were caught

outside by the storm with no shelter at hand.

The principal damage was from the lightning. For a few moments the wind blew a gale, but it did little damage other than to blow over a few small articles in various places. The home of C. L. Simmons, 3721 Clinton avenue, was struck by lightning. A chimney was twisted and the 16-year-old daughter of Mrs. Simmons was stunned by the shock and fright. The streetcar company had its great trouble at the bottom of grades where the torrents of water collected in the depressions of the street, choking the sewers and backing up until the sewers

could carry away the surplus. A string of cars was delayed at Fifteenth avenue SE and Eighth street, and for a time the passengers threatened to stampede. They were prevented by the trainmen.

Corson of Minneapolis, and C. C. Riedel of Minneapolis.
