GETTING READY FOR WHITE BEAR SKIPPERS

Minnetonkans Tuning Up for the Yearly Set-To with St. Paul Sailors.

Now that the rowing regatta is over, the biggest event on the summer program of water sports at Lake Minnetonka is the sailing regatta between the White Bear Yacht club and the Minnetonka Boat club on the 25th, 26th and 27th of the present month.

Either the Minnetonka or the Delta will represent the Minnetonka Boat club in the A class, and in the B class, either the Terrier or the Pathfinder.

The Minnetonka is a new boat, built by Johnson & Doerer works at White Bear. She is owned by a syndicate of seventy-five members of the Minnetonka Boat club.

The Delta is owned by Charles Gedney. It was originally a White Bear syndicate boat built especially to compete with the Royal Canadian Yacht club for the famous Seawanhauk cup.

The Pathfinder was built by the Johnson Boat Works of White Bear, and is owned by Lewis Glass. Eugene Markos, who graduated from White Bear, skips the boat. Lewis Glass takes his orders at the mainmast for the club.

Interest in sailing has received a decided impetus this year in the appearance of the new boats.


MINISTER TO SPEAK AT DOUBLE-HEADER


