

SNAKE RIVER VALLEY MARVELOUSLY RICH

Idaho Develops So Rapidly Along Agricultural Lines that Existing Lines Are Unable to Take Care of Business Offered—Growth Attracts Eastern Capitalists.

G. T. Propper of Boise, Idaho, one of the original promoters of the San Francisco, Idaho & Montana road, the new short line between Minneapolis and the coast, whose headquarters during its promoting stage was in Minneapolis, is at the Hotel Nicolet.

Concerning the enterprise in which he is interested, Mr. Propper had nothing to give out, although he admitted that he was in Minneapolis on business connected with the road, which is now building.

MINNESOTA IS IMPORTANT

Concerning activity in the railroad world, Mr. Propper said: "The world better qualified to enlighten you on that subject. As you know, we of the west have grown to think of Minneapolis as quite as important as New York or Chicago as a financial nucleus."
