DESPICEND MAN FOUND, A SUICIDE

Cecil Van Wyck Discovered Dead on Gas Stove

In Notes to Wife He Accused Her of Driving Him to End His Life—Mrs. Van Wyck Left Home in Fright Last Evening After Husband Upbraided Her.

Despondent Cecil R. Van Wyck committed suicide in his room at 319 Eighth street S. last night by turning on the gas and closing the doors.

Van Wyck was employed as a shoe salesman in a downtown store and was on his vacation when he took his life.

When the door was opened last night and upbraided his wife because his supper was not ready.

Early today the woman from whom the Van Wycks rented their rooms, noticed the gas and remembering the trouble, she broke into the room.

There crouched on hands and knees was the body of the suicide.

When the room was visited by Coroner Kistler today he found two notes.

The Virginia & Rainy Lake company, were poorly written and could hardly be made out.

In them the suicide accused his wife of driving him to suicide and ended by asking that his body be buried at Sault Ste. Marie.

The body was viewed by Coroner J. M. Kistler who ordered it taken to the morgue.
