PROHIBITIONISTS IN NEW WAR ON SALOONS

NO MORE LIQUOR SALES NEAR THE SCHOOLHOUSES.

Rigid Enforcement of Ordinance Barring Saloons Within 400 Feet of Schoolhouses, and Blockade Against Reduction of the Distance by Ordinance as Now Proposed.

Strict enforcement of the ordinance which prohibits the sale of liquor within 400 feet of public schoolhouses is the demand of Minneapolis prohibitionists who will use every effort to defeat the ordinance now pending in the council.

The saloons on the "black list" of the prohibitionists are the following: Thompson & Jackson, 411 Central avenue; H. J. Schumacker, 1001 Washington avenue N.; J. Cardinal, 203 Central avenue; and Bolinger, 419 Fourteenth street S. The first two are clearly within the 400-foot limit, and are at present operating without license.

W. G. Calderwood, secretary of the State Prohibition association, began the campaign for enforcing the schoolhouse ordinance in May, when he brought an action against W. J. Herth, a saloonkeeper at 1115 Washington street, whose license had been renewed on May 17.

Mr. Calderwood said yesterday: "Herth's case and the cases of Thompson & Jackson and Schumacker are entirely alike. Herth had been granted his license, and it was not until he had been forced to close immediately. In the other cases the ordinance was violated before the granting of the license."

THIRD REGIMENT WILL MARCH TO LAKE CITY BATTERIES A AND B AND ENGINEERS GO ALONG.

Mimic Battle Will Be Fought on Goodhue County Soil and Warriors Will Then Advance on Camp—Regular Officer Will Keep Tab on Maneuvers for War Department.

The Third regiment, Minnesota national guard, will leave today for its annual encampment. The regiment was ordered to start July 23, but in order to get an early start for a practice march and maneuvers which are to be indulged in, the regiment started today.

The Third regiment is made up of Companies A of Duluth, B of Anoka, C of Goodhue county, D of St. Paul, E of Worthington, G of Princeton, H of Olivia and I of Crookston. Companies B, F and H leave this morning to join Company D at Zumbrota. The four companies will start their march from Zumbrota.

Colonel C. Vanduzee will have command of the St. Paul column, and Major E. S. Person of Zumbrota will command the Zumbrota column. The two columns will meet somewhere near Zumbrota. The four companies will take place a mimic battle. The two columns will then proceed to Lake City, working out military problems as they proceed.

Battery A of St. Paul and Battery B of Minneapolis, and the company of engineers, will proceed in the march with the St. Paul column. The column will be accompanied by provision trains and the hospital corps.

Report to War Department. Gilbert A. Youngberg, first lieutenant of engineers, U.S.A., Fort Leavenworth, will proceed with the two columns on their way to Lake City, being assigned as an instructor in field work. He will make an official detailed report of the maneuvers to the war department, and the war department will in turn supply the Minnesota adjutant general with a copy of the report that the Minnesota guard may benefit by such criticisms and suggestions as Lieutenant Youngberg may make.

JOHN GOODNOW TO QUIT CHINESE POST

SHANGHAI MISSION WORKER TELLS OF MINNEAPOLITAN.

O. W. Douglas, Manager of the Mission Press, Outlines Conditions in the Port, Where "Foreigners" Are on Territory of Their Home Governments and Have Their Own Courts.

John Goodnow, formerly of Minneapolis, adviser to the viceroy of Ling King, (Two Province) China, will sever his connection with the imperial government at the close of his six months' service. This is the statement of C. W. Douglas, formerly of Kansas, manager of the American mission press in Shanghai, who is visiting friends in Minneapolis after eight years' residence in China.

Mr. Douglas is in the mission service of the Presbyterian church and the establishment of which he is the head is the largest of its kind in the world. It was established in 1861 by the Presbyterian board of missions and is devoted to the publication of Christian literature.

Discussing his experience in China, Mr. Douglas said yesterday: "I went to China in 1898, and arrived in Shanghai two weeks before the battle of Manila bay. Since then I have been continuously in the mission press work."

How Foreigners Live. "As a rule, I think, Americans have little comprehension of the condition of foreigners in Shanghai and the law by which foreigners are governed. In the heart of the city is a district six miles square, which was ceded to foreign governments by the Chinese in the 50's, and this tract, which is divided into the central district, the northern district and the western district, is under the control of foreigners who are entirely immune from Chinese law and interference. The French colony is governed separately by the French, but the remainder of the foreign district is under the control of a joint council chosen from among all the powers."

"Of course each colony has its court and if an American is charged with crime he is tried before the American consul. Chinese of the better class are allowed to live in the foreign sections and in cases where the natives are charged with some breach of peace they are given a trial before a joint court composed of one foreign and one Chinese judge. The American colony in Shanghai is on American territory and a two-cent stamp will carry a letter to Shanghai as just as it will to other parts of the United States. We have our own United States postoffice."

"Of course times were exciting in Shanghai when the Japanese-Russian controversy, and sympathy was universally with the Japanese. The Chinese realized that the Japs were fighting their battle, and the hatred of the Chinese against the Japanese was increased. The French colony in Shanghai is one of great importance. Mr. Douglas will visit his interests in Shanghai and vicinity and he does not intend to keep his position after his six months' term expires."

Mr. Douglas will visit his interests in Kansas and will return to Shanghai in the fall.
