

GERMANS ADEPT AT FOOD ADULTERATION

Exposures in Kaiser's Realm Rival Packingtown Revelations of America. By W. W. Jermans. Washington, July 30.—The meat inspection disclosures in England have recently been duplicated by similar disclosures in Germany, and now France is beginning to get ready for a general inspection of all packinghouses and slaughtering plants.

Spilled Meat in Sausage. In an article published in the Straits Times recently, giving a short history of the fight against adulteration in Germany, it was stated that according to statistics collected by Dr. Jucknack of Berlin, the number of prosecutions for adulterating food products; in 1898 the number had increased to 3,000; in 1901 to 4,000, and in 1902 to 5,000.

Medicines Dangerous. "Wines, chocolates, ocos and brandies are largely adulterated, and many of them have been discovered to contain absolutely injurious and dangerous substances, used for the purpose of adulteration. In a list made recently in one of the large cities of twenty-eight samples of medicines, fourteen were discovered to be not only impure, but injurious as well. Cosmetics came in for their share of condemnation.

Fruit Is Colored. "The practice of adulteration is much more common in small places in Germany, where there is little or no inspection, than in the cities where the government has its laboratories for the analysis of food products, its detectives, both male and female, with its system of stamping all articles of food. Berlin holds first rank among the German cities in the stringency with which it prosecutes those who attempt to procure the purity of food products.
