FOOD FOR AN ARMY TAXES THE WOMEN

SUPPLIES EASY TO GET, SEWING IS HARD

Coffee by the Barrel, Butter by the Tub, and Bread by the Hundred Needed to Keep Veterans in Marching Trim—How Difficulties Were Met.

More than 1,000 gallons of coffee, 1,000 loaves of bread, 200 pounds of butter, 100 gallons of cream and a hoghead of sugar will be used in the G. A. R. parade to provide refreshments for the old soldiers.

Tell me the maximum amount of bread you will eat and I will make it the minimum amount we will deliver to you," promised the equally hospitable Pillsbury-Washburn company, which will donate the bread that will be used.

Most Popular Fireman. The question of making 1,000 gallons of coffee was the biggest one of the federation had to consider. It was kindly taken from them by H. S. Tuttle of the Minneapolis fire department, who has devoted some of his spare time to it.

Mr. Tuttle will be the champion coffee-maker in Minnesota Wednesday morning, for he will make fifty gallons at a time. He will boil the coffee in the biggest engine in the department, and the coffee will be made in three barrels. Big sacks, each holding 12 1/2 pounds of pulverized coffee, will be placed on a motor truck, and the water turned on it through a spray nozzle. As fast as the coffee is made it will be sent in a tray to the booths, where the corps must solve the problem of keeping it hot. Most of the women on whose lawns the booths will be erected have offered the use of their stoves, as no gasolene stove can be used outside that day for fear of fire.

Tuttle in Demand. The women were exceedingly interested in the account of Mr. Tuttle's plans, and there was an anxious inquiry "is he married?" at the close. Each corps will remember him with a corps badge, so that he will be the most decorated man in Minneapolis during the encampment, and that is promising a great deal.

From 50 to 100 women will be at each booth, where details from the G. A. R. posts will be on duty to keep back the crowd. Souvenirs as well as food will be distributed, so the women will have the most enjoyable day. They voiced the sentiments of the rest as she exclaimed with a sigh: "This is no picnic, girls! It's the biggest task we have ever had, but we are going to do it and do it well!"

As a memento of the G. A. R. encampment a complete and accurate regimental roster will be issued to the members of the Eleventh Minnesota Volunteer Infantry association.

The list contains the names of more than 600 of the living and deceased members, the addresses of the living having been carefully verified within a year. The whole is the result of ten years of search and inquiry by the president of the association, Captain W. O. Wilson. The booklet is handsomely printed on fine paper in two colors and inclosed in an artistic cover.

There will also be a number of pictures of the old buildings in Tennessee, the war neighborhood of the regiment.

TAKE AN EARLY START

Travelers bound for Minneapolis may leave Chicago any time between the 10th and 18th and until all of these trains arrive in Minneapolis the streets of the country will be crowded to the limit.

COMMANDER OOMES FRIDAY

National Headquarters Will Be Opened on Arrival of Official Party.

The national encampment of the Grand Army will be unofficially opened at 8 a. m. Friday, when "Corporal" James Tanner, commander-in-chief, with his staff will arrive in Minneapolis.

Commander Tanner will come from Washington in a special car and it is expected that his party will number at least twenty prominent veterans.

Departments are scheduled for Saturday or Sunday, but Monday morning trains bearing the department commanders and their staffs will begin arriving in Minneapolis. In every instance the department trains will be met by committees of local Grand Army men who will conduct the visitors to their headquarters.

Department Commander P. H. Coney of Kansas, with one of the biggest delegations expected at the encampment, will arrive at 7 a. m. Monday. He will headquarter at the Hotel Brunswick which at once be opened and supporters of Captain Coney for commander-in-chief of the G. A. R. will begin their campaign.

FORMAL NOTICE OF PREPAREDNESS

G. A. R. ARRANGEMENT COMMITTEES ISSUE STATEMENT.

Minneapolis Will Meet Its Full Duty in Extending Welcome and Entertaining Guests for the Fortieth National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Formal announcement that Minneapolis is prepared and awaiting the Grand Army's arrival at encampment next week has been made to the entire people of the country by the committees in charge. The following statement has been issued to the press and news associations for publication all over the United States:

"The several committees in charge of arrangements for the fortieth national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be held in Minneapolis from Aug. 13 to 18, 1906, desire to announce that their plans are fully matured and that the city will be fully prepared to meet its full duty in connection with this great event."

"Soldiers' quarters in school buildings are ready for occupancy and the patriotic people of Minneapolis are ready to open their doors to receive all who come. The decoration of the city is fast assuming shape and the national colors will be shown in profusion. Plans for the great parade are practically completed, and correspondence indicates that there will be not less than 20,000 veterans in line. All of the downtown streets of the city have been repaved. This work, which ordinarily would have covered two or three seasons has been crowded into a few months."

"Extra precautions have been taken to provide against delay in handling baggage and in announcement in the vaulting of tickets. All in all, Minneapolis will present a splendid appearance to visitors, who will find every one of her citizens ready and anxious to render them any service within their power."

"Only one discordant note has been sounded thru all the weeks of preparation, and that came from a Washington, D. C. periodical, ostensibly devoted to the interests of the old soldiers. It assumed to criticize their host, not only before they had become the guests, but before they knew anything about the plans which the committee had been formulating for months. The only apparent effect of this criticism has been to add to the burdens of the local committee, by making it necessary for them to answer the many questions which were prompted by the articles."


