Merriam Park Resident May Die as Result of Injuries.

Christensen of Olivia is a close second, being only a quarter of one per cent lower in score. A. D. Fisher of New Richmond is third, score 97.5. A total of 193 sample tubs were inspected by the butter scorers.

W. R. Atchinson of Stanton and J. L. Lehuher of West Concord divide honors for first place in the cheese contest, scoring each 97.5. G. Andrist of West Concord was second, score 97.

CANAL DEFAMERS LIARS, HE SAYS

GEORGE D. BROOKE TALKS OF WORK IN PANAMA.

Minneapolis Man Who Holds Responsible Position in the Zone of the Big Ditch Says It's a Fine Country in Which to Live—Tells of the Gigantic Operations on the Waterway.

“Panama is a fine country to live in, the isthmian canal is the greatest and most interesting engineering project of the world, and the men who have been circulating stories about the evils of the country and the impossibilities of the work are not telling the truth. They are unfortunates who have been discharged for cause or have some imagined grievance.”

This statement was made emphatically to The Journal last night by George D. Brooke, superintendent of motive power and machinery of the isthmian canal commission. Mr. Brooke was formerly of Minneapolis, having been superintendent of motive power of the Minneapolis & St. Louis and other railroads. His family lives at 2742 Bryant avenue S. He is spending a six weeks' furlough at home, and will return to Panama Aug. 15.

“The sanitation of the isthmus are as good as, or better than, those in Texas and the other southern states,” continued Mr. Brooke. “We now have more malaria cases here on the canal and railroad, and during the twenty-one months of my stay we have had not one case of yellow fever. Malaria, of course, there is, but this is brought on largely by lack of care and indiscretions. A man of fairly temperate habits can go into that country without materially changing his mode of living.”

Not a Summer Resort.

“We have made many changes and improvements. We have paved the streets of the towns, furnished pure water supplies, cut down the bacteria-breeding fungus which used to grow in profusion about the streets, and in other ways increased the healthfulness of the place. When I first went there, New Orleans quarantined against Panama; now Panama quarantines against New Orleans. Of course the isthmus is not a summer resort, and one must take reasonable care of himself and make take his two to four grains of quinine every day. That is one thing I would not do in the states here.”

“The most remarkable thing about the canal work, and the one that always impresses the visitor, is its magnitude. The work in the states has no conception of the size of this great work, nor of its difficulties. Before I went to Panama I thought I had had enough experience in the engineering work. When I began the work here I found that the only use my experience was to me was to give me the capacity to study out the best methods to be used there. The conditions are so entirely different, everything has to be done on so much larger a scale than anything I had ever seen or heard of, that the problems presented by the Panama work will be solved by reverting to first principles. My experience there has meant more to me than I can tell, and I am thoroughly in love with the work.”

Gigantic Undertaking.

“In the first place, think of moving 18,000 men away from their homes, putting them in a tent city, and sending them for their board and lodging in a wild and unsettled country. Is that a little undertaking? We now have things down to a working basis. The whole length of the canal is one camp or city. We have three mammoth hotels, two more are under construction for the laborers, and we are building one that will have every modern improvement, convenience and elegance. This will be done in time to receive President Roosevelt when he visits the isthmus next year.”

The Railroad Work.

“The railroad also required much labor. We have been building 85 to 100 miles, and will probably have to triple-track and will probably have to build locomotive shops in operation and are building others. We have forty-four new engine locomotives on the way, 100 tons each. We are building steam shovel shops, and the shovels that we use are larger than any I ever saw before. They have a five-yard dip and handle from five to six-ton rocks, man by man.”

The Locks are also monster problems, and I think it is safe to say that if we use concrete for the mammoth dam and locks that are planned, in the next eight years before the completion of the canal we will use more cement than the entire world's output for a year.”

Johnson Wins Prize

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POLICE POWERS TO BE EXTENDED

STREETCAR EMPLOYEES WILL MAKE ARRESTS.

Detectives from Other Cities Will Come to Minneapolis to Assist Local Authorities in Keeping Crooks in Subjection—Every Precaution Taken to Prevent Molestation of Visitors.

Streetcar conductors and drivers will be authorized to make arrests of their statutory right to arrest all “crooks” caught by them in swindling by means of cards or other instruments during Grand Army day and other public work. This is the subject in the fourth department conference, held by Rev. W. R. Keesey of Owatonna.

Mrs. H. W. Longely of St. Paul has begun her studies in “Foreign Missions and the Epworth League.” H. B. Crozier of the third department took up the topic “Christian Citizenship,” urging the organization of Christian Citizenship classes. “Literary Culture and Denominational Literature” was the subject in the fourth department conference, held by Rev. W. R. Keesey of Owatonna.

Words of Law.

Section 4970 of the penal code provides: “Every person who is an every conductor or employee of any railway car or train, captain, clerk, or other employee of any boat, station agent or other person employed in any place of public resort, with or without warrant, shall arrest any person found in the act of committing any act of swindling with cards.”

Outside Detectives Coming.

Fifteen detectives from other large cities will arrive in Minneapolis tomorrow and Saturday and will co-operate with the Minneapolis detective force in making life a burden to all the many members of the “crook” family. The officers that are coming will be detailed from the regular detective forces of Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Milwaukee, Detroit, St. Paul, St. Louis, and other cities. While the Minneapolis expense will be borne by the Minneapolis department, Mayor Jones and Chief of Police Doyle would like to be able to double the number of officers, but the department has not the money.

Special Powers Given.

The plain clothes force will be materially enlarged. Old, experienced patrolmen will work in citizens' clothing. When the plain clothes force is increased and nearly five hundred special officers will be sworn in. Railway officials have asked to have their station and platform men made special police for the purpose of keeping the streets clear and to handle the crowds better if the system of badges showing special police power.

Circles—All Have Part

Ladies of G. A. R. Plan to Make Everybody Comfortable.

The circles of the Ladies of the G. A. R. have been assigned to duty during the encampment. Each circle has been given certain states to look after, and the members will see that everything is done for the pleasure and comfort of the whole delegation from those states. They will be met at the train and provided with accommodations and the local circle will testify by many social affairs and to double the number of officers, but the department has not the money.

BEDE'S NAME ENTERED FOR ANOTHER TERM

Congressman J. Adam Bede of Pine City visited the state capitol today and paid \$20 to the secretary of state for the privilege of going on the primary ballot as a candidate for re-nomination.

“I don't know what the situation is in the district,” he said, “but I judge that I am not likely to have opposition at the primaries. I am going to stay here for the encampment. I have some lecture dates to fill afterward, and the first week in September will make some speeches in the Maine campaign. I will be back in Minnesota by Sept. 15 to take part in our campaign.”

Asked about the Cannon boom for president, Mr. Bede said it seemed to be taking well, and he thought there was a good chance for “Uncle Joe.” He was much pleased at the re-nomination of Congressman Lorimer of Chicago, one of his associates on the river and harbors committee. “Lorimer's defeat would have put the Chicago drainage canal back ten years,” says the Minnesota man.
