ALASKANS HONOR MINNEAPOLIS MAN

FRANK WASKEY IS ELECTED FIRST CONGRESSMAN.

New Delegate Lived Here Until Five Years Ago and Still Has Local Business Interests—Is Prominent in Far North Mining and Political Circles.

Frank Waskey, formerly of Minneapolis, has been elected by a large majority as Alaska's first delegate to congress.

Waskey was born in Minneapolis and lived here continuously up to five years ago, when he went to Cape Nome. Since then he has been unusually successful in his mining operations and has become one of the leading men in Alaska.

The following telegram was received today by G. H. Hilde and explains itself: "Elected as Alaska's first regular delegate to congress by large majority."

It is expected that the congressional delegate will come east within the next month and will spend some time here. Mrs. Waskey has been in the city for the last few weeks visiting friends and relatives. She left for Seattle the first of this week, knowing of her husband's political preference.

Governor J. A. Johnson has asked the attorney general for a ruling on whether the three railroad commissioners of the state are constitutionally holding office. The point has been raised that the railroad commissioners have not been appointed by the governor.

The attorney general has frequently been called to the question of the constitutionality of the law which provided for the election of the board of railroads and warehouse commissioners.

HORSE SHOW SEPT. 11-15

SUM OF \$8,000 IN PRIZES READY FOR HEAVY HARNESS STEPPERS, TANDEM, ROADSTERS, PONIES, SADDLE HORSES AND OTHERS.

Sixty cities in the United States are holding horse shows. Minneapolis and St. Paul have only been intermittently in the list. This year, however, they will be foremost in the fall indoor shows.
